COVE ATTACK TOO SEVERE

LA GRANDERS HUMBLER *BY
MIGHTY CHERRY PICKERS.

Nine to Nothing Score Not Indicative
of Interest Attracting to Yesterday's Contest.

La Grande's fond hope of trimming Cove went glimmering yesterday before the biggest baseball crowd of the season. The final score was 9-0 and La Grande did not have the 9 end of it, either. Cove deserved to win because he out-pitched, out-fielded and out-hit the home team, which ought to be enough to win any ball game, and then she out-lucked the locals, too. But the luck feature was just a sidelight, the three other reasons for winning being ample. Shelton and his Elgin friends came down in numbers confident of victory and heavy wagers were placed on the clever pitcher. He went seven innings and was displaced by White, formerly of Imbler, who allowed one run.

"Red" (Roy) Alexander was never in better form. Men like Crippen and Hickey, who generally hit safe several times, got nowhere, with one exception, when Hickey hit clean once. Rosenbaum and Garrity each hit out twice, and with Hickey's single got all the clotting La Grande could muster, and they were never bunched. Fourteen La Granders hit the dust of "Red's" offerings, while the visitors were in their best hitting form. The score by innings:

How Come, Recorder?

Even such metropolitan newspapers as the Elgin Recorder can go wrong, and that particular paper takes a lot of delight in magnifying the faults of other scribes. Listen to this description of the now-famous Dunn play at Elgin two weeks ago:

"La Grande was victorious in the game with the locals on the afternoon of Tuesday, the score being 7 to 6. The game was presented to La Grande as the result of a decision by one of the umpires—Pidoock. The play came in the eighth with Dunn, the first man up for La Grande. He hit a short infield fly toward first that appeared to be a foul, but the ball landed three feet inside the line and was fielded by Chandler, who, with the ball in his hand, stepped into the line between the batter and first. At first it appeared that the ball would land in foul territory and Dunn made no attempt to reach first, but after the ball landed fair it was so called by Umpire Hallgarth, and Dunn walked from the batter's box toward the center of the diamond and began an argument, then ducked around Chandler, who was still in the line with the ball in his hand, and went to first, where he was called safe by Pidoock, who was then umpiring on the bases. Elgin protested the decision but to no avail, and rather than subject the spectators to a lot of rag-chewing, resumed the game. Some blame Chandler for not throwing the ball to first, but it was unnecessary, inasmuch as Dunn was out the instant he stepped out of the line. The decision put Elgin up in the air, with the result that Dunn scored, making it the winning run of the game."

All of which is all right except that Dunn was not out—that he was not out for stepping out of the line at the point he did. Tighten up your belt, Mr. Recorder Sports Editor, and read the law.

ROAD BUILDING IS RAPID

Wallowa County Roads Show Improvement as Workmen Advance

La Grande people who visited Wallowa county yesterday for recreation or business, report that the graveling of the state highway is progressing very satisfactorily. On the Lostine end of the road there is about one and one-third miles of gravel placed on the road bed. From the Minam end to the town of Wallowa about three miles are finished. The grading is finished, with the exception of about a mile at the head of the canyon, a short strip near the Courtney place and a short strip just east of town.

Men are now working on the rock cut at the Lewis farm east of Lostine and the road is closed at that point. Travel has to detour by way of Evans going up the valley.

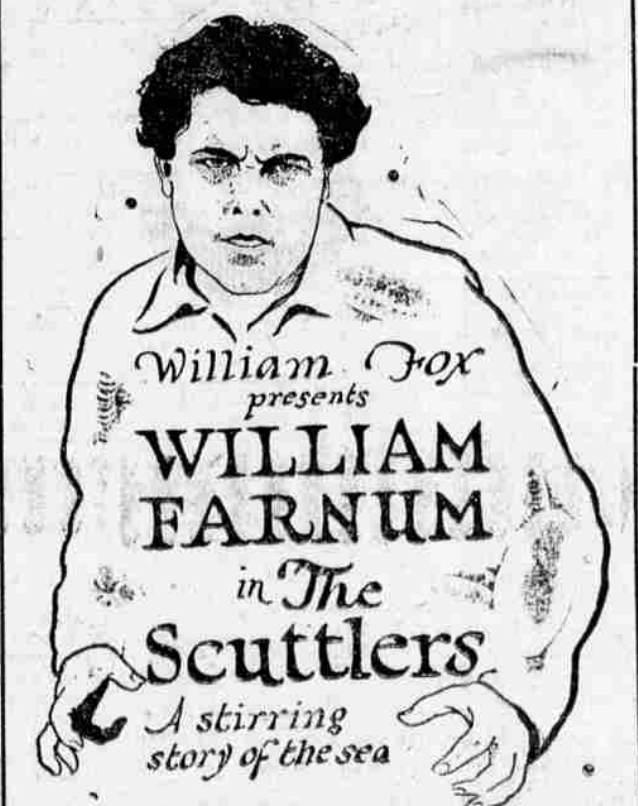
