ROAD BONDS MAY BE SOLD

HOPE IS SLIGHT BUT NOT ENTIRELY GONE

Necessity of Paying Interest Interest of Two Per Cent Makes Overhead too Great for Banks.

Although the banks of Union county turned down the proposition of absorbing the \$400,000 road bonds recently advertised and on which a high bid of 94.5 was received, there is still some hope that the road bonds will be marketed in time to use some of the money for road work this year. At the meeting, attended by representatives of all banks of Union county, held Saturday afternoon the banks decided that they would not absorb the bonds at the present bid.

The plan which had been agreed on by the banks, and the county court was to have the banks take the bonds at par and absorb the difference, marketing them at the bid price to the successful bidder. This would have cost the banks an und \$22,000. The state law requires banks to pay two per cent interest on county funds and the necessity of paying this interest in addition to making up the difference between the price of the bonds received by the banks at par makes it impossible to pay the interest at the present bid.

If the bonds can be marketed at 95.5 or 97, this including the interest as well as the amount required to bring their value to par, bankers are not very optimistic about the bond market but it is possible that a better price can be obtained and as soon as this is the case the bonds will be marketed.
