FUND CUSTODY DENIED.

County Treasurer Held to Be in Charge of School Moneys.

SALEM, July 20.—Under a law enacted in 1919 the county treasurer is custodian of all school district funds unless the county court makes and enters an order to the effect that such county elects to apply this law, according to a legal opinion handed down here today by I. H. Van Winkle, attorney-general.

In cases where such an order has been entered each school district remains the custodian of the funds of the district, not including the proceeds of bonds issued by the district nor of taxes levied to provide for the payment of interest thereon and a sinking fund for the payment of such bonds.

The school clerk is required to give a bond for the safekeeping of the moneys.

PETITION FOR LIGHTS READY

BUSINESS MEN ASKED TO ATTEND MEETING

Sixty-three Favor the Ornamental Lights and None Oppose; Means Removal of Poles on Adams

At the meeting of the city commission this evening a petition was presented to the commission asking that the city install the ornamental lighting system proposed some weeks ago, the system to be placed on Adams avenue, from Fourth to Greenwood and on Depot from Jefferson to Washington.

The petition is signed by sixty-three business men and a petition demonstrating against the proposed system is also attached, but this was not signed by any. The petitions were circulated by Al Andrews, chairman of a committee of the Ad club, appointed some months ago for the purpose of determining the sentiment of the business men and property owners on this question.

Andrews canvassed the entire business section affected by the change and found that the only objection on the part of the business men was that not enough territory was included in the proposed plan.

One business man at first absolutely refused to sign the petition unless it was changed to include Adams avenue to the east city limits and nearly all of those insisted on changing the original plan so that the entire block from Fir to Greenwood be included instead of only a portion of that block.

As the petition now reads this additional half block is included. Because of no provision being made in the budget of the city for this year for these lights Andrews convinced those opposing the ornamental lighting system plans because only the congested district along Adams avenue is included that by signing before the commission this evening the road would be paved for doing the balance of the work next year.

In order that the commission have an opportunity of hearing the opinions of the business men on this matter all are asked to attend the meeting of the commission this evening in the city hall at seven-thirty. "I think that if we appear before the commission this evening and impress on them that we will not be satisfied with the ornamental lights on only a portion of Adams avenue it will help greatly in inducing the commission to include this town in the budget next year," Andrews said. "But it will hardly be possible for the city to do so much work at this time when no provision has been made for it and the cost would be at least doubled."

At previous meetings the commission has practically agreed to have the system installed this fall if the business men and property owners affected will be willing to pay for the rewiring that is necessary in their buildings when the poles are removed from Adams avenue to the alleys.

The matter was brought to a head about a month ago when J. T. Lottridge, general manager of the Eastern Oregon Light and Power company appeared before the commission and asked that a decision be made, as his company's pole line on Adams avenue would have to be rebuilt before winter and that if the city builds its new lighting system now it would be possible for the power company to move its poles to the alleys.

The life of the poles is from fifteen to twenty years and Lottridge explained that if the city should in a year or two years decide to change its lighting system the company would under its charter resist removing the poles, the only alternative being left the city in that case being that the city stand the expense of moving the poles.

In describing the condition of the present installation Lottridge declared that the poles were in such a condition that no chances could be taken with another winter and had the wires were practically holding some of the poles in place.

MINT GROWING LUCRATIVE.

Production of 17,000 to 20,000 Pounds of Oil Is Estimated.

BROOKS, Ore., July 20.—From 17,000 to 20,000 pounds of peppermint oil from plants grown in Central Oregon this year is the estimate by Adolph Ziefle, dean of Oregon Agricultural college school of pharmacy, who is spending part of his vacation in the interests of the Oregon Peppermint Growers' Co-operative association. Since July 1, Dean Ziefle has been working near Brooks, Coburg, Newberg and other points instructing the farmers relative to approved methods of planting and cultivating peppermint plants. He expects to supervise all harvesting and distillation of all peppermint plants grown in Central Oregon this year.

"The average price of oil last year was \$5.25 a pound," said Dean Ziefle. "Should this price be offered this year, peppermint will be the most valuable crop farmers could raise. From all indications the yield of peppermint oil will be greater this year than last because of the fact that the season has been almost ideal for peppermint culture."

Experiments are being conducted in the school of pharmacy on pressure distillation, as well as the effect of certain weeds on the quality of oil of peppermint. The Mint Growers' association is planning to refine its raw oil, and in order that the refining process may be under supervision of the faculty of the school of pharmacy, the plant may be located in Corvallis, said Dean Ziefle.

LOCAL TEACHER HAS RESIGNED

The board of education has received the resignation of Miss Fay Armstrong, supervisor of physical education in the La Grande schools during the past year. Miss Armstrong has been attending summer school at the University of California at Berkeley and she has been offered a position at a greatly advanced salary, which she has accepted.

Miss Armstrong's position in the La Grande schools is the only vacancy at the present time. Her successor has not been decided on by the board of education.
