ten miles an hour. It only lasted for half an hour, after which it cooled off some, so that we had a fairly good sleep.

Mr. Black speaks in the highest terms of the splendid receptions tendered them on the way by the real estate boards at Salt Lake, Denver, Omaha and Chicago. At Salt Lake they were met with autos and taken all over the city and canyon. Salt Lake, the great bathing resort, and treated to a swim in the lake. Lunch, dances and all the other attractions were given. Then they were taken back to the city and through the temple ground, and an organ recital was especially arranged for them at 4 p. m., after which they went to the commercial club rooms, where a delightful banquet and programme was served.

"Here we met the California delegation of about one hundred, who took train with us on our special of all brand new cars, where every convenience was arranged for our comfort, and a more democratic and jolly crowd it has never been my pleasure to mingle with," said the La Grande booster. "At Denver we were met by a large delegation with cars and taken through the city and into the mountains, and treated to a large trout dinner, speeches and a programme. There were present at this meeting about 1000 men and women. I was called on for a speech, which gave me quite a shock. However, I managed to give a good account of our little city and county. At Omaha, we were again met by a large delegation and cars and taken first to the Athletic Club and treated to a plunge and a shower bath, and lunch; then to the business men's den, where we were initiated to many weird and strange things, having to pass through a long underground and overhead passage, where lions were roaring and once in a while one would jump out at you. Then a gush of wind would blow your hat off, then suddenly you would come up against a screen wire with your nose, etc., until finally we came out into a large auditorium, where we were treated to a large show. I cannot tell you all that happened there. We were then taken over the city and landed at Happy Hollow and again banqueted. After a most excellent

program we were taken back to the train at 9 p. m.

At Chicago the first evening smoker and get-acquainted meeting was arranged for all the men in the Auditorium Hotel. At another place the wives of the Chicago realtors entertained the women. 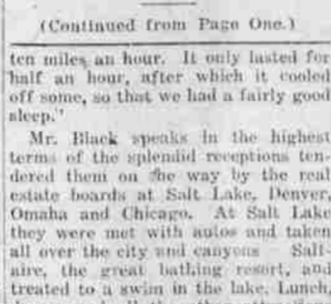
