## CLYDE AITCHISON IN OREGON

No Information Vouchsafed as to Columbia Basin Differential

PORTLAND, July 21.—Clyde B. Aitchison, member of the interstate commission, reached Portland Saturday night and registered at the Multnomah hotel. He is making a circuit of western cities on cases involving rail rates and came from San Francisco, where he participated in the Klamath Falls rate case. Prior to that he was in Salt Lake and Ogden. He will remain in Portland several days before going to Seattle and thence to Boise, Idaho.

No information was vouchsafed regarding the Columbia basin rate differential of 10 per cent favoring Portland and Vancouver, Wash. Mr. Aitchison said he had been away from Washington since June 24, and had received no information regarding action on recommendation of the commission.

It was his opinion, however, that no nation-wide reduction of freight and passenger rates would be made. He said that thousands of adjustments were being made to cover conditions which applied to localities, and implied that this process would gradually work toward satisfactory rates. Apparently the rates are not retarding business to any extent, he said.

## DRESSLER EYES NORMAL

Corvallis Man Would Become Head of State Normal

SALEM, July 21.—Reports reaching here today indicated that E. D. Dressler, dean of the department of education at Oregon Agricultural college, is an active candidate to succeed J. H. Ackerman as president of the state normal school at Monmouth. Professor Dressler previously was connected with the faculty of the normal school.

Other persons mentioned in connection with the presidency of the normal were J. A. Churchill, state superintendent of public instruction; E. F. Carlton, superintendent of the Eugene public schools, and W. C. Alderson, superintendent of schools for Multnomah county.

It was said today that the board of regents of the normal school would not select Mr. Ackerman's successor until Mr. Churchill, now at Des Moines, Iowa, returns to Salem.

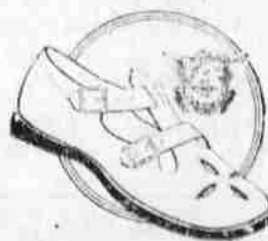
