STEAMER MAKES WAY TO PORT

PORTLAND, July 22.—The Steamer Effingham, of the European Pacific line, which struck a rocky bank at Stella, Washington, last night, leaving a hole in the bow, arrived here today under its own steam. There was sixteen feet of water in the forward hold.

The steamer ran into the bank while close on the Washington side, when the steering gear broke, said the men on board. She began to sink rapidly. S. O. S. calls were sent out. The ship went down by the bow but the engine room remained clear. It was then that the officers decided to proceed to Portland.

JAPAN MAKES RESERVATIONS

TOKIO, July 22.—The Japanese cabinet, says the Nichi Nichi Shinbun, has decided to participate in the proposed Washington conference with the general program of not discussing any questions affecting the sovereign rights of the participants nor the Shanghai and Yape questions, which it held were decided at the Paris conference.

FRANCE WILL SEND TROOPS

PARIS, July 22.—France will send reinforcements to Upper Silesia, whether or not Great Britain joins in the movement. The French government will insure the safety of 10,000 French soldiers already on the ground.

JEWS SAIL FOR PALESTINE

Zionist Association of Far East Aids Return Movement. SHANGHAI, July 22.—Effective aid is being given by the Zionist Association of the Far East in support of the world-wide return to Palestine movement. Following the departure of a first group of 42 Hebrews, bound for Palestine from China, steps are being taken to arrange transportation and other details for further groups to sail from Shanghai in coming months.

Most of the members of the first party were war refugees from Russia, Poland, Lithuania and Roumania, and they included merchants, farmers and artisans.

The travelers were to disembark at Port Said and there board the newly constructed British war-timber railroad for Haifa, Jaffa and Jerusalem. They will be cared for at their destination by representatives of the Zionist immigration committee.

CAN SEND MONEY BY DIRECT CABLE

Payments Made Abroad Are to Be Made in United States Funds; Payee is at Advantage

The Western Union Telegraph Company announces that arrangements have been made to resume direct money transfer service to all points in Austria, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Yugoslavia, Rumania and Bulgaria. This service will be supplementary to its present direct cable money transfer service to Great Britain, France and other European countries. This rearranged service is on an entirely new basis in that remittances for persons in Austria and the new states formerly comprised in the Austrian empire as well as for points in Rumania and Bulgaria, be made in United States legal tender, dollars. In other words \$100 cabled to, say Vienna or Prague, will be paid at destination in United States currency instead of an equivalent amount of foreign money usually the case in these countries. It is pointed out that since the payee abroad will receive American funds he will be in a position to convert them into local currency on the most advantageous terms since the banks in those countries will give a more favorable rate of exchange than is available on this side.

If the event of non-payment at destination the amount to be refunded to the sender on this side will be the same as the principal deposited, which is another advantage in the case of a depreciated foreign currency which is dwindling in value. The Western Union Telegraph company believes that the opening of this new service should be of considerable convenience to people desiring to send money cheaply, quickly, safely and direct to their friends or relatives abroad.

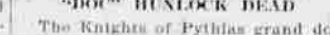

"DOC" HUNLOCK DEAD

The Knights of Pythias grand domain of Oregon and the Elks' lodge have each lost a strenuous worker for fraternal brotherhood in the sudden death of E. H. "Doc" Hunlock at Portland. Mr. Hunlock was in business here for several years, operating a skating rink where the Zuber dance hall now is. He moved from here to Portland and underwent a successful operation for a serious ailment. Of late months he was a field worker for the Grand Lodge Knights of Pythias. Details of his death are meagre, except that he was seriously ill for five days, and died suddenly at the Good Samaritan hospital.

Dr. Hunlock came to Oregon from Wilkesbarre, Pa., about 40 years ago, and for about 25 years practiced near Heppner, after which he engaged in business for five years at La Grande. He then retired and moved to Portland where he has been living for the past 10 years. His residence was at 445 Columbia street.

Dr. Hunlock was very well known throughout the eastern part of the state as he held several political offices. In this capacity he also made many acquaintances in Western Oregon.

Two sons, Charles W. Hunlock, of Salem, and Benjamin T. Hunlock, of Portland survive.

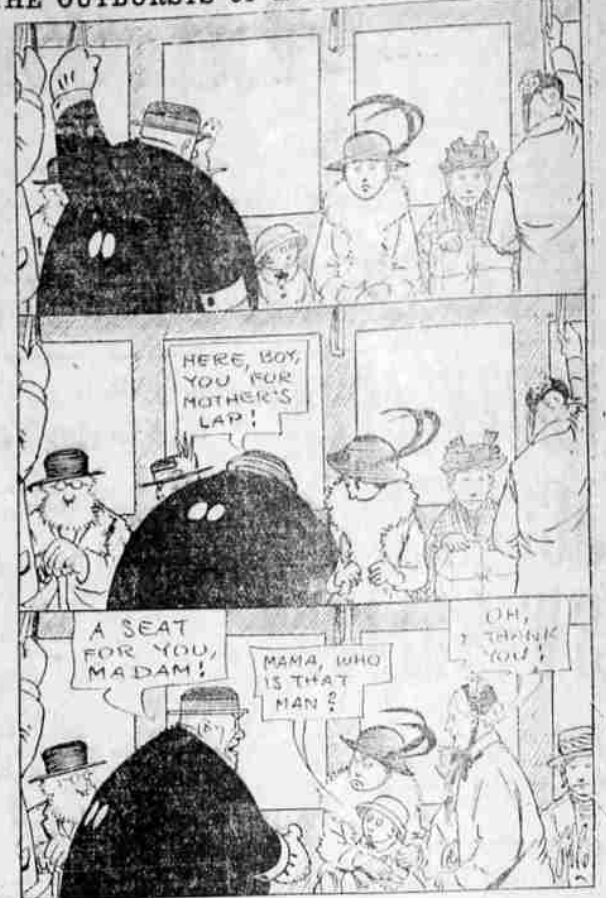
