NEW YORK, July 22—Arthur Irwin, veteran baseball player, manager and scout, committed suicide by jumping off a steamer bound for Boston yesterday. Following an operation, the doctors told him he had only a few days to live. It was thought pain drove him to suicide. He had two wives and two families, one in Boston and one in New York. His Boston family consisted of a wife and a 24 year old son, two daughters and nine grandchildren. His New York family consisted of a wife and a 24 year old married son. Neither widow suspected the other. Each said Irwin had been a devoted father and husband. He married each, and neither suspected the existence of the other. Both claimed he had not been away from home much, although years ago the Boston widow's relatives insisted Irwin had another woman in his life. He hid his New York wife goodbye, and was enroute to Boston to see his other spouse when he committed suicide.
