PUBLIC LAND MONEY ALLOTTED

TWO YEAR PERIOD YIELDS TRIFLING SUM

Counties With Large Areas of Undeveloped Lands Fare Best in Distribution of Money

Union county has been enriched to the amount of \$144,477 as the result of the apportionment of \$6,629,600 by Secretary of State Sam Rorer among the various counties in the state. The money so apportioned represents five per cent of the receipts from the sales of public lands in the state of Oregon. Under the law this money is apportioned according to the area of each county, no other factors entering into the distribution.

The money apportioned is for the two year period ending June 30, 1922. The amount of this biennial apportionment accruing to Union county might seem small to some but when the amounts received by other counties is taken into consideration Union county has a far greater sum per inhabitant than some of the more populated counties.

Multnomah with its city of Portland received only \$31,250; Marion county with the state capital received only \$32,831; Harney county with its vast stretches of land awaiting settlement received the greatest amount, its share being \$688,859; Malheur comes a close second with \$685,411.

Other apportionments in the state are as follows: Baker, \$212,222; Benton, \$47,772; Clackamas, \$129,271; Clatsop, \$56,941; Columbia, \$45,911; Coos, \$112,911; Crook, \$207,641; Curry, \$102,889; Deschutes, \$208,931; Douglas, \$341,336; Gilliam, \$83,301; Grant, \$313,471; Hood River, \$37,561; Jackson, \$196,681; Jefferson, \$122,851; Josephine, \$121,431; Klammath, \$416,051; Lake, \$549,271; Lane, \$219,881; Lincoln, \$89,911; Linn, \$155,551; Morrow, \$449,441; Polk, \$49,101; Sherman, \$57,981; Tillamook, \$78,031; Umatilla, \$229,061; Wallowa, \$218,111; Wasco, \$162,491; Washington, \$50,691; Wheeler, \$118,171; Yamhill, \$49,511.

There are a total of \$1,188,480 apportioned in the state.
