## YOUNG TEAM IN IMBLER STRONG

WALLA WALLA TEAM TO FACE REMARKABLE YOUNGSTERS

Minister at Imbler Has Coached Juveniles to Perfection; Many To Attend Game

Out at Imbler there is a group of little fellows who can play baseball better than the average nine of their age. They range from 11 to 15 years, yet they have taken on, and thoroughly spanked 10 teams of similar ages of Union county, and now are aspiring to clean up on Walla Walla, which claims the champion-

ship of Eastern Washington. The game is set for 2 o'clock next Wednesday afternoon at Imbler. Several La Granders who are strong for developing players among the youngsters are going out to help matters with their rooting. Anyone who has seen these chaps play, realizes that Imbler is going to have a wonderful town team in about three or four years.

### Preacher is Coach

The man who has developed these lads is a Methodist preacher, Rev. Lines, of the Imbler circuit. He has coached the team until they have won two games at Elgin, two at Union, two grammar school teams at La Grande, one at Baker and two at Cove. He will go the limit for his charges any time, and they stand by him.

## JIMMY MURPHY OF THE PACIFIC COAST WINS AUTO RACE

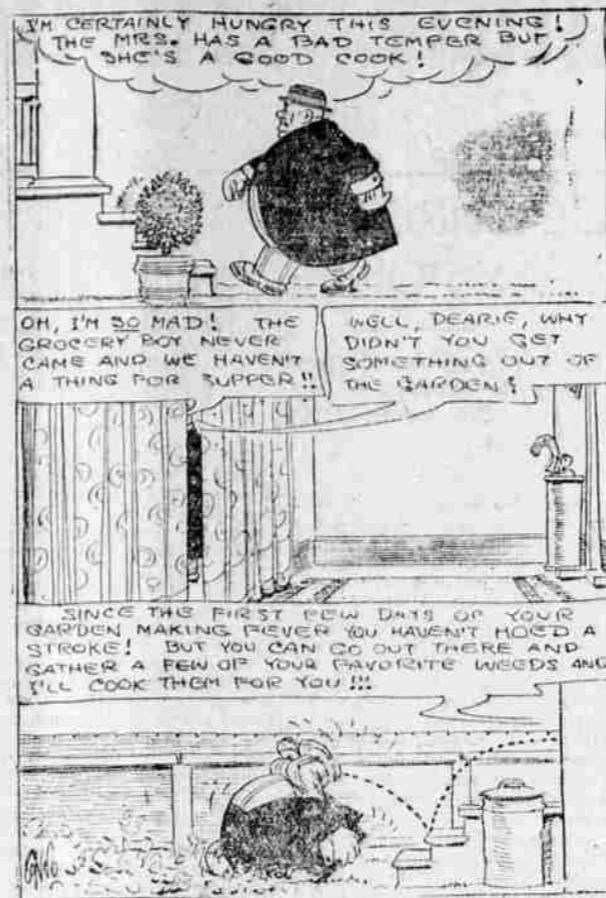

## Butter Making Institution Big Aid to City Payroll

From an humble beginning about 15 years ago, to one of the most complete and up-to-date-minute creameries of Eastern Oregon today, is, in brief, the story of the rise and growth of the Blue Mountain Creamery of this city. It was originally instituted in cramped and limited quarters at what is now the Currey Real Estate office on Elm Street. After its operation there for a short time, it was moved to its present quarters on Washington avenue, where the building was renovated, repaired and enlarged from time to time until today it is about the last word in creamery housing.

During the past few years the direction of the plant has been in the hands of the present owner and manager, George Hopkins, who has seen a majority of its development. J. W. Bush of La Grande, P. H. Green, now of Georgia, H. S. Mangus of Wisconsin, and other have been instrumental in the early development of the concern. But it was under the guiding hand of Mr. Hopkins that the latest and most extensive improvements were brought about.

A few months ago the company drilled a private well which feeds the ice plant, in which three tons of ice are daily turned out, the ice feature being a necessary adjunct to the creamery. The cooler equipment is complete in all respects, and aside from making ice, maintains the required temperature in the various storage and cooling rooms, ranging from just freezing in one compartment to zero in another.

The ice cream department is modern. The ingredients are mixed in an automatic mixing machine and is then brought to the right degree of congelment in the cooler. The cream used for the ice cream, well as that employed in the manufacture of butter is all clarified and pasteurized before going into the food product. The average ice cream output is 135 gallons per day although that is not the capacity by and means.

The butter room is amply sufficient and adequately cooled to handle the output of butter, facilities for which would take care of a ton a day. In the receiving room where milk and cream comes in from the countryside, the company has equipped itself with the most modern and sanitary conditions. washers and rinsers of the latest type have been established. The churns are now.

The payroll of the institution is another prop in keeping La Grande's niche in the state's payroll leadership. Including the branch which the Blue Mountain Creamery company operates at Union, the payroll of this concern runs between \$10,000 and \$12,000 annually.

"We have added the necessary appliances that are required in an up-to-date creamery," said Mr. Hopkins in showing an Observer representative over the plant. Mr. Hopkins learned the business in the middle-west, and since coming to La Grande about 12 years ago, has been almost constantly associated with this plant, adding to his practical knowledge by close study and attention to the growth of the business as a national industry of stupendous proportions.

"With the addition of cement floors in all rooms where food products are handled, the sinking of our own well and the general improvements to the place, we believe we can say that few creameries of Eastern Oregon are as well equipped as we are."

The institution has adopted the prevailing practice of paying cash for its cream, and thousands of dollars are circulated through the business channels of this community by reason of this business house. These cream and milk checks are, of course, not included in the \$10,000 payroll already mentioned, that sum being only for help employed about the place.
