## DECLARES CURE MUST COME SOON

REV. MECKLENBURG SPEAKS AT METHODIST CHURCH

Speaker Says International Christian Campaign is Only Cure For World Chaos

The cure of the present world crisis, in the opinion of Rev. George Mecklenburg, secretary of the Hellenic area of the Methodist Church, must be applied soon, or the world will enter into greater chaos than it is today. Rev. Mecklenburg spoke at the Methodist church yesterday morning. After reviewing the chaotic condition of the world, and citing argument to show all non-Christian religions of the world are retrograding or at a standstill, he proceeded to advance a cure for conditions as they exist, politically, economically and morally. "An international and dynamic Christian campaign," he said "must be undertaken within the next few years. He contended that only a christianized internationalism can cure the evils, and as long as nationalism and many religions prevail, there can never be contentment for all races and colors are living in a new age and that the world must adopt the policy that there is no permanently inferior blood or creed—that the whole world is of one blood and that the brotherhood of man cannot come as long as that fact is not granted.
