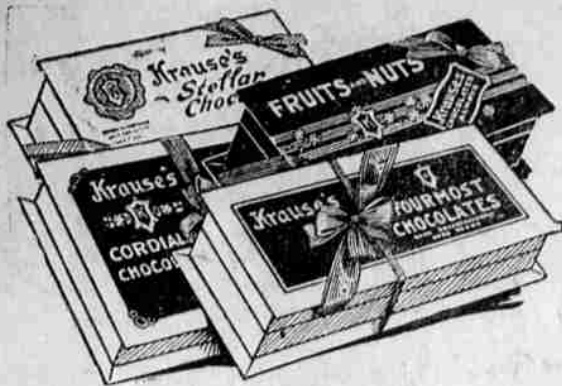

OFFICER RETURNS WITH FRED MAYO

Deputy Sheriff John Striker returned yesterday from San Francisco with Fred Mayo, former resident of Union, who is charged with having taken a Velle automobile sedan belonging to Mrs. William Hutchinson, Jr., of Union, without permission and driven it into California.

The car was well insured and when the loss was reported the insurance company immediately became active. Just whether the efforts of the company's officers had anything to do with locating the car is a question, but it is known that the sheriff's office here in conducting a search of its own disclosed the fact that Mr. Mayo was in San Francisco with the car. Sheriff Warnick immediately sent Deputy Striker to the California city with instructions to return Mr. Mayo to Union county and the case will be investigated thoroughly.

RAIN HELPS THE VALLEY FARMERS

Copious Showers Will Aid in Growth of Spring Grain in the Claim.

The rains last night and early this morning will be a benefit to the farmers, rather than a detriment, according to a number in from the valley to get supplies.

Harvesting has barely started. A few hinders are working but the head-end have not yet been put into service. It is thought the rain will be a benefit to the harvesting and it is recognized that it will aid greatly in maturing spring grain yet in the growing stage.

This was an old-time Grande Ronde morning marking harvesting preparations. Walter Pierce was up bright and early grooming his Ford and filling it with gas and water. Other large ranchers were hurrying back and forth from town, getting the needed supplies as they prepared to begin a harvesting campaign that will save one of the biggest crops this valley has ever produced.

County Agent Harry Avery this morning stated that he believed that the barley and rye were benefited and that some of the fortyfold wheat which was beginning to dry out will be considered toughened because of the showers. It is possible that slight damage was done in some fields but indications are that the damage was more than offset by the good done, especially to spring wheat.

SHOULD RECORD DISCHARGES

Although it will be many months in all before the state bonus machinery is in such condition that men can make formal applications for their bonus of loan, Mrs. Fay Catlin, secretary of the Red Cross, who has aided many service men in adjusting compensation claims and bonus claims from other states, said today that the men can do one thing now that will aid them materially in getting action when the proper time comes. "This is having their discharges from the service recorded by the county clerk at the court house."

"While the procedure for securing the bonus in this state has not been outlined yet it will probably require sending the original discharge to Salem," Mrs. Catlin said today. "This has been the means adopted in other states. In order to make accessible the discharge during the time when the original is in the hands of the officials it should be recorded. Then at any time it will be possible to secure a copy that will be accepted by the government in lieu of the original."

Mrs. Catlin called attention to a number of cases in which men had sent their discharges to Olympia to secure the bonus money due them from Washington and needed their discharges and were greatly inconvenienced because the congestion in Olympia delayed action on their applications. Had the discharges been recorded here a verified copy would have been available.

If the service men delay in having their discharge recorded at the court house it is also very likely that congestion at the court house will delay their claim when they are ready to send their papers to Salem and have to wait to have the recording done.

two amendments. The first amendment is explained as follows:

Increasing Limit of Indebtedness.
The first amendment, like all in this group, is submitted by the commission. It deals with the limit of indebtedness, and would raise the present limit of 10 per cent to 15 per cent. The bonded indebtedness of the city is such that it would prevent bonds being floated for the water project and still keep within the 10 per cent limitation now provided by the charter. Hence, to get the new water supply, the voters must first adopt this amendment. If the city waits until the bonded debt is reduced sufficiently to float a new bond issue and keep within the 10 per cent limit, many years would elapse before the project could be undertaken.

The measure would read as follows, if adopted:
"Section 14, the City of La Grande, shall not have power to issue bonds or incur any indebtedness, exclusive of bonds or indebtedness issued or created for local improvements for which assessment liens are levied, in excess of fifteen per cent of the taxable property within the city, the amount thereof to be ascertained from the last preceding assessment made for County and State purposes."

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE HAS INCREASED

The average daily attendance in the schools of Union county increased from 3295 in the year 1920 to 3677 in the year 1921, according to a report prepared by Mrs. A. E. Ivanhoe, county superintendent, and filed with the state superintendent of public instruction.

There are 164 teachers employed in the schools of Union county. Average monthly wage of men teachers is \$175.82 and women teachers \$121.26. It cost a total of \$480,754 to conduct the schools during the year 1920, or \$166 per pupil. A total of 719 boys and girls were enrolled in the high schools of the county and 278 completed the eighth grade.
