DEMONSTRATION IS ARRANGED

FARMERS TO BE TAUGHT POULTRY CULLING.

L. M. Jensen's Model Plant is to be Scene of Culling Lecture Next Saturday.

Four poultry culling demonstrations are to be held this week under the auspices of the Union County Farm Bureau. The first, which is to be held at the A. R. Haller place at Medical Springs, is being held this afternoon. Tomorrow afternoon at four o'clock one will be held at the C. J. Pratt place at Imbler. Ray Duncan, of Cove, is making arrangements for one at Cove Friday at one thirty in the afternoon. He has not yet announced where it will be held.

The last, and one that will probably attract more than usual attention among poultry raisers is to be held at the L. M. Jensen poultry plant, just beyond Riverside Park, at two

o'clock on Saturday afternoon. The Jensen plant is one of the model plants in the state and Mr. Jensen has between 700 and 1000 chickens at his place. He is considering doubling the capacity of his plant. The incubators and all other parts of the plant are among the most modern obtainable and because of this it is believed that an unusually large number of farmers will attend this demonstration as it will afford them the opportunity of inspecting the plant at the same time.

F. H. Cockell, a poultry expert connected with the Kerr, Gifford company, will have charge of the demonstration. He will explain the methods of determining whether a hen is a producer or merely boards off the rest of the flock at the expense of the owner. Observation of the physical characteristics that determine whether a hen is a good layer or not will be thoroughly explained by Mr. Cockell.

TURNER TRIAL INTEREST BIG

WALLOWA COUNTY PEOPLE ARE MUCH INTERESTED

Farm Labor is Scarce in Wallowa County With Wages From \$2.50 to \$3.50 and Board

All Wallowa county was much agog over the trial of the state vs. Robert S. Turner, of Paradise, accused of shooting Crawford Hunter. There seems to be no denying that the defendant shot Hunter, but circumstances leading up to it are in dispute. A suit for \$10,000 by Hunter against Turner for damages has also been filed.

The trouble ostensibly arose over some horses, but when Mrs. Hunter took the stand and testified she and Turner had been intimate, interest in the trial became all the more general. About 50 men have been brought all the way from Paradise and Flora to testify at the trial. F. S. Ivanhoe of La Grande is one of the attorneys for the defense.

Labor is Scarce
Farm labor is scarce in Wallowa county, in sharp contrast to most communities, with the result that the county agent has taken it upon himself to bring outside help to Enterprise where it is distributed to the needed districts. In some instances, however, the men do not get as far as Enterprise. Wallowa farmers inducing them to leave the train at Wallowa station. Wages paid run from \$2.50 to \$3.50 and board. Not only has the temporary shortage of men stopped or retarded farming but has brought road construction down.

Dr. Orchestra to Survive
Announcement is made at Enterprise that the big Enterprise Philharmonic orchestra, J. David Haines, director, will be maintained by a splendid association formed for that purpose. There are 24 amateur but efficient musicians in the organization, and it is one of the things Enterprise points to with civic pride.

HIGH OFFICIALS TO PASS THROUGH

KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS MEMBERS ON WAY TO CONVENTION

State Deputy J. H. Pearce and Other Members Will Join Party in La Grande

Wednesday evening when passenger train No. 19 goes through La Grande it will carry a special car containing Supreme Knight Jas. F. Flaherty, Supreme Secretary, Wm. J. McGinley and other prominent officers of the Knights of Columbus who are on their way to the international convention at San Francisco.

State Deputy J. H. Pearce and local members of the order will join the party here and journey with them to the Golden Gate city where all will take part in the program of events which marks the annual meeting.

At Portland considerable preparation has been made to entertain the officials for the short time they will stay in that city and the entertainment committee is headed by Frank Loughran, Joe Hanley and Frank Sinnott. One of the features of the entertainment Portland will pull off is a military tableau in the civic center of the city. An aerial pageant led by Eddie Richenbacher, the aerial ace, will also be a feature. During the convention at San Francisco a month's patriotic demonstration has been planned. The Knights will also launch their \$5,000,000 hospitalization and educational work for ex-service men and their \$1,000,000 movement to popularize the study of American history.

The La Grande Labor Council has already discussed the matter of a celebration with Pendleton and Baker, and it is the desire of the majority to follow the tri-city celebration plan as started by Baker last year, when La Grande and Pendleton also aided in the celebration.

SEATTLE TAXIDRIVER IN DURANCE FOR KIDNAPPING WOMAN

PENDLETON, July 26.—Arthur Humphrey is in jail at Seattle on request of the office of Zooth Houser on a charge of kidnapping Mrs. M. Humphrey, daughter of Rev. Storm, of Weston, Oregon.

The arrest followed the alleged kidnapping of the woman from Weston Saturday when Humphrey, said to be a taxi driver of Seattle, invited Mrs. Aldrich to take a ride with him in a Buick car. She is said to have been spirited away from the home of her father and taken to Seattle.

Information on the case is to the effect that Mrs. Aldrich has been in Seattle for several months, where she made the acquaintance of Humphrey, but a short time since, she returned to Weston. The visit of Humphrey and the disappearance of the woman followed.

The woman's husband was drowned about 18 months ago. Humphrey will be brought here for trial on a charge of kidnapping.
