WIG DECREASE IN FOREIGN WHEAT CROP IS SHOWN

WASHINGTON, July 27.—Prolonged droughts abroad, practically world wide, promise the American farmer prosperity unparalleled, government officials say. Only Italy seems to have escaped this blight. As a result, the problems the American farmer have had to face during the past year by reason of inability to market surplus products seems not only to be solved with the bumper crops promised here, but prosperity for all seems assured.

ONE KILLED AND TWO ARE WOUNDED IN PISTOL DUEL

EVERETT, Wash., July 27.—John Higgins, of Denver, is dead; James O'Brien, of Spokane, is shot through the neck; Al Solentine, of Mount Vernon, deputy sheriff of Skagit county, was shot through the left jaw in a pistol battle in a hotel at Mount Vernon today. Higgins and O'Brien were suspected dope runners, and Sheriff Reay and Solentine went to arrest them. During Reay's temporary absence from the room, the suspects disarmed Solentine and covered him with their guns. Reay returned and opened fire, killing Higgins and wounding O'Brien.

King of Signboards.

Probably the most elaborate signboard ever exhibited was that of the White Hart at Soke, Norfolk. Sir Thomas Browne, in 1687, described it as the "noblest signpost in England, about and upon which are carved a great many stories as of Charbon and Corberus, Actaeon and Diana, and many others." This king of signboards was erected in 1655, and is said to have cost over £1,000. It was in existence up till the end of the Eighteenth century, and possibly may still be preserved somewhere or other.—London Chronicle.

When Smoking Was Under Ban.

To crush the increasing love of pleasure the Connecticut law of 1647 sternly decreed that only the solitary smoke should be permitted. Only once a day, at dinner or otherwise, might tobacco be used, and then not in company with any other. No one might use tobacco in any other house than his own in the town where he lived "with and in company of more than one who smeth and drinketh the same weed, with him at that time."

For violating any item of the law the penalty was sixpence, and only one witness was required.—From "Ye Olden Blue Laws," by Gustavus Myers.
