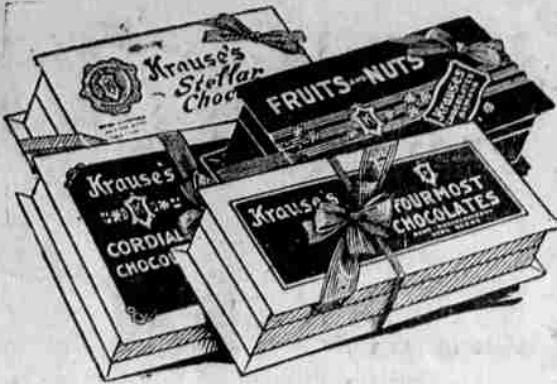

American Osteopaths Are Told that
Best Cure is "Sitting Straight"
Convention Lasts All Week

CLEVELAND, O., July 27.—The "sinker slouch" posture may cause ulcer of the stomach and even sometimes cancer, declared Dr. S. V. H. Beck of Chicago today, at the 25th annual convention of the American Osteopathic Association in this city. Faulty posture permits the spine to become permanently distorted, explained the speaker. This interferes with the nervous controlling the stomach and the blood vessels nourishing it.

The convention lasts the entire week with an attendance of about two thousand osteopathic physicians, surgeons and specialists from all the states and from Canada. "Sitting tall" is a prevention and cure of many of the afflictions of

women which is proposed by Dr. Francis Graves of Boston who showed the delegates how to do it. She said that American women are too much in the habit of sitting down, eating candy, knitting and growing fat.

"Motor spine," as a new disease announced by Dr. Charles C. Teall, Dean of the American School of Osteopathy, who explained that it is characterized by partial loss of function of the feet and legs. It is caused by excessively rough automobile driving for a long period of time particularly with trucks.

CITIES DIRECT CAMP GROUNDS

SURVEY OF STATE SHOWN MUNICIPAL PLAN GENERAL

Free Fuel Question is Making Headway—Many Towns Supply It Now

Out of a total of 35 cities and towns of Oregon where tourist camps are provided, 21 of them are maintained by the municipalities, and 23 furnish free fuel. In one instance a private individual attends to the matter, in another a Ladies' Club is responsible, and in others, like La Grande, the city and Commercial bodies are jointly responsible.

Free fuel for campers has come to be a much mooted question with a prevailing sentiment growing stronger everywhere that the campers are willing, and glad, to pay a reasonable fuel bill provided the fuel is made accessible. Twenty-three camp grounds have free fuel at present and 12 sell fuel at cost.

Camp ground facilities outside of La Grande embodied in this review, include:

Portland—Twelve acres. Bull Run water; wood, gas and electric stoves, wash trays and wash racks for autos; electric lights; sanitary; public park with swimming tank and children's play ground in connection. Registration fee of 50c covers a period not to exceed ten days.

Albany—Shaded park of 35 acres near business section maintained by city. City water, fuel at cost, sanitary, electric lights, bathing facilities, auto wash rack, laundry facilities free.

Arlington—Open park of six blocks maintained by city. City water, sanitary, brick fireplace.

Ashland—Five or six acres maintained by city in connection with the city park. Springs and city water, sanitary, gas plates, meter system.

Baker—One city block in connection with city park and natatorium. City water, sanitary, electric stoves, meter system.

Bend—Six acres near town kept up by city and owner of land. City water, brick fireplace, free fuel.

Brownsville—Thirty acres maintained by city. Water, sanitary, stoves, free fuel.

Burns—About one acre maintained by Burns garage near center of town. Well water, community kitchen. Fuel at cost; sanitary.

Coeville—Four acres maintained by city, half mile from center of town on Pacific highway. City water, sanitary, open fire, fuel.

Cottage Grove—Ten acres in connection with city park. City water, sanitary, cooking facilities, fuel.

Dallas—Three acres near center of town maintained by city. City water, sanitary, concrete stoves, fuel.

Elgin—Seven acres in connection with city park. City water, electric lights, sanitary, swimming.

Enterprise—Two acres one mile from town. Water, sanitary, stoves, fuel.

Eugene—Ten acres on river bank maintained by city. City water, electric lights, stoves, fuel, sanitary, bonanza with fireplace, rest rooms and showers.

Freewater—One-half acre maintained by Ladies' Clives Club. City water, brick ovens, fuel.

Grants Pass—Five acres maintained by city on river bank. Well water, sanitary, electric stoves, meter system, swimming.

Hood River—Three acres maintained by city. City water, sanitary, brick ovens, most provide own fuel.

Hamilton—Half block covered with shade. Water, sanitary, fuel.

Independence—City block near center of town. City water, sanitary, camp ovens, fuel. Maintained by Independence Retail Merchants' association.

Klamath Falls—Eleven acres maintained by city. City water, sanitary, cooking facilities. Fuel can be obtained.

Marshfield—Five acres maintained by chamber of commerce. City water, sanitary, fireplace and gas, fuel.

Medford—Two acres, city water, sanitary, brick stoves, fuel at 25c a basket.

McMinnville—One acre maintained by city. Water, sanitary, cooking facilities, fuel.

Myrtle Point—Two acres in center of town. City water, sanitary, rest cottage, ovens, fuel.

Newberg—City block maintained by city. City water, sanitary, cooking facilities.

North Bend—Seventy-five acres near center of town. City water, sanitary, cooking facilities, fuel.

Ontario—Two acres, city water, sanitary, ovens, fuel.

Oregon City—Twenty-acre, acres overlooking Willamette Falls. Mountain water, sanitary, gas on meter system.

Pendleton—Two acres. City water, sanitary, cooking facilities, fuel at 40c.

Prineville—Three acres in center of town. City water, sanitary, ditch, ovens, fuel.

Roseburg—Three acres in center of town. Pure water, sanitary.

Salmon—Five acres in center of town. City water, sanitary, brick ovens, fuel at cost.

Seaside—Three blocks in center of town. City water, sanitary, concrete ovens, fuel at cost.

St. Paul—Two city blocks. City water, sanitary, no cooking arrangements.

BILLION DOLLARS OF U. S. LIFE INSURANCE IS APPLIED FOR

Over a billion dollars of U. S. Government Life Insurance has been applied for and the applications, approved, according to an announcement by Director C. R. Forbes, of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance today, the number of policies of this converted insurance being 298,386, covering a commuted value of \$1,000,702,500. Of this amount, \$2,978,228 has already been awarded in meeting insurance claims.

Regardless of how long a service man's Wartime or Term insurance has been lapsed, or canceled, or regardless of how long he has been discharged from the service, a new ruling of the Treasury Department permits him to reinstate or reinstate and convert, at any time before January 1, 1922, upon application and payment of only two monthly premiums in the amount he wishes to reinstate, together with a satisfactory statement of health. Reinstatement up to three months after lapse may be effected without a physical examination.

WEATHER HAS BEEN IDEAL FOR WORK ON COUNTY ROADS

APPLE CROP ESTIMATES SHOW LARGE RETURNS.

put but shipped, buyers and growers themselves place the figure at points varying between \$575,000.00 and \$600,000.00. Culls and home consumption will readily bring the total to this figure.

In arriving at an arbitrary cash value it becomes necessary to weigh carefully the crop elsewhere, and assume the demand to be about normal.

Eastern Crop Very Light

The northwest stand alone in the high percentage column. The big apple-producing districts of the United States include the following states and the government July 1st estimate obtained with most painstaking circumspection: New York, 24 per cent; Virginia, 7 per cent; West Virginia, 8 per cent; Ohio, 22 per cent; Illinois, 29 per cent; Michigan, 40 per cent; Kansas, 3 per cent; Washington, 84 per cent; Idaho 75 per cent; Oregon, 80 per cent and Montana, 89 per cent. The grand average for the United States is a small fraction above 24 per cent. Under conditions of this sort, it

is not at all far fetched to assume that the better grades of apples are going to bring over \$2.00 and the mediums \$1.75. It is upon this assumption that the total cash value given above is determined.

Delicious in Ascendancy
A county-wide tour divulges another interesting fact, namely that the Delicious type is in the ascendancy and many orchards that are only now coming into bearing include many trees of that popular variety. Elgin, of course, leads, Allred, Imbler, Mt. Glenn and May Park grouped approximately equal in production. The Rome Beauty continues to lead in production with Gano a probable second; Jonathan, Winter-bananas and other popular varieties holding their own pretty well.

Year Free of Oppression
There has been no great oppression from pests or disease, the weather has been favorable, and, fortunately, sections like Union where the apple business was going into decay through carelessness, the orchardists have "come out of it," and cleaned up and are in on the cash cleanup.

Marketing is Weak Spot

Viewed from an airplane, as it were, the results for the county are substantially this: Growers are as reasonably sure as anything can be they are due for a cleanup financially; the profits on a big crop in a year remarkably short elsewhere, should, and unquestionably will, be highly encouraging. There lacks but the more efficient marketing methods to insure a fancy return on the credit side of the ledger. Following years of lean returns from one cause or another, the fat year has been earned, and it is here.
