**PORTLAND MARKETS.**  
PORTLAND, July 28.—The price of cattle was steady today and unchanged from yesterday's quotations; hogs were a quarter higher, prime light selling for \$12.50 and \$12.75. Sheep were weak.

### WEEDS MUST BE CUT NOW

The weed eradication ordinance will be strictly enforced from now on, according to Roy Flexer, chief of police. According to the ordinance all weeds and grass must be cut between July 1 and July 25 and the cuttings removed. A number of complaints have been received regarding places which are a menace and those failing to take care of their property face a fine in municipal court.

The tree trimming ordinance, which requires all trees overhanging the sidewalks to be trimmed so that all branches are at least seven feet from the sidewalk, will also be enforced and the entire city inspected so as to make certain that all have complied with the ordinance. The police want the trees to be in such shape when winter comes that the usual trouble with snow-laden branches obstructing pedestrian traffic will be avoided. In the past there has been no ordinance requiring trees to be trimmed but with the present ordinance on the books the city will be firm in requiring the proper trimming this winter.

### OLD FRIEND PASSES AWAY

William Miller is sorely depressed today, following receipt of a letter from St. Paul which tells of the death of Michael N. Goss of that city. Mr. Goss and wife spent some time at the Miller home last summer and many La Grande people will remember the gentleman. He and Mr. Miller were intimate friends for about half a century, and the news of Mr. Goss' death has upset Mr. Miller. The nature of the demise was itself tragic. A son of the deceased writes as follows concerning it:

"I went to the train July 24th to meet Dad on his return from the south, but failed to see him. Thinking he had missed his train I waited for the following train, but when the first had stopped after pulling out of the depot and they had stopped, I walked up to the crowd and saw the basket going through the Pullman window. I heard some one say it was ex-Commissioner Goss. I hopped aboard the Pullman and got to the berth as they were putting Dad in a rubber blanket. Mother was writing breakfast for him at home. We had a post mortem and found he died from enlargement of the heart."

Mr. Goss was one of the foremost citizens of St. Paul.

the only known substance he will not eat is pine needles.  
Governor Oleott has received from

the Multnomah county commissioners a check for \$77,799.15, representing the debt owed the state from tolls collected on the Interstate bridge because of advancements made the county by the state when the bridge was built.

E. M. Crail, Multnomah county school superintendent, reports to J. A. Churchill, state superintendent, that 2470 pupils were enrolled in the schools of that county during the last school year, an increase over the previous year. The percentage of attendance for the year was 95 against 87 the previous year.

A total of 3,108,868 gallons of gasoline and 105,777.5 gallons of distillate were sold by the Standard Oil company in Oregon during the month of June, according to the company's report to the secretary of state. The total tax paid under the tax law of 1919 was \$31,617.56 and under the tax law of 1921 it was \$32,146.45.

The Alsea River Lumber company of Douglas county, a concern capitalized at \$1,500,000 has been granted a receivership. The firm owes about \$500,000 to various creditors, with assets of about \$1,500,000. It is understood the receivership was a friendly one.

Two romances, which began in Austria more than seven years ago, culminated at Bend, when Miss Maria Robak and John Bradetich and Miss Helen Zlatich and George Bradetich were married. The brothers came to Central Oregon penniless, but are now prosperous farmers. Difficultly was experienced in getting passports for the girls, who reached Bend last week.

Seaside will celebrate on August 6 and 7, with a dedicatory ceremony upon the opening of the new seawall.

The passenger ticket business of the Southern Pacific company of Portland will be withdrawn from the consolidated ticket office at Third and Washington streets on August 1 and will be handled after that date through the company's passenger station at Fourth and Stark.
