COMPETITION MUCH KEENER

PORTLAND, July 30.—In the past there has been lively bidding on particular jobs before the State Highway Commission, but Thursday the grading of ten miles on the Claitwood-Tolado section of the Corvallis-Newport highway established a new highwater mark. Twenty-one contractors bid on this work. There were so many bids to compare and analyze that the commission announced that award would have to go over.

Contracts Are Awarded.

Contracts awarded were: Lakeview—La Pine highway—16.8 miles grading, awarded to Lake county for \$57,714.50.

Tillamook county—Wilson river to Riverton, 1.5 miles of gravel, awarded to Tillamook county for \$13,842.

Deschutes county—Unit No. 2, from Pauline prairie to Klamath county line, on The Dalles-California highway, 9 miles grading, awarded to Deschutes county for \$11,948.00.

Skwap county—Miles Crossing to Skipanon, 2.9 miles shoulders; 1.3 miles grading and macadamizing, John Slott & Co., \$34,325.

Bridge contracts awarded: Clackamas county—Bridges on Try-on and Sucker creeks, paving on bridge floors; Warren Construction company, \$5,688.

Wallowa county—Bridge over prairie creek; Oscar Oberg, \$9,685.

Washington county—Bridge at Gale creek; Beam Construction company, \$1,539.

A number of bridge and grading contracts were referred to the engineer.
