

# BODY OF EHRMAN HALL IS SHIPPED

Word has been received at Union and in La Grande to the effect that the body of Ehrman Hall, one of Union county's sacrifices in the recent war, was shipped from Jersey City Sunday morning and is now en route. While it is not definitely known, it is believed the body will be sent off to Portland in company with the remains of other Oregon soldier dead, and be re-diverted to Union from that point. The funeral services will be held in the Methodist church at Union at a date to be announced later, and the Elks lodge of La Grande will have a conspicuous part in the burial.

Mr. Hall's death was one of the particularly tragic incidents of the war. He enlisted from Union, where his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. F. Hall, still reside. On the night of his departure he was initiated into the La Grande lodge of Elks and had to hurry away to catch his train, even before the session had adjourned. His cheerful farewell to his newly made brothers was followed just a few weeks later by his death at the front in France, where he, like a few others, had by fate's queer manipulations, been pushed with wonderful rapidity.

**Planting Union Fish.**  
Superintendent Bonney, of the Union fish hatchery, went to Sumpter yesterday to plant trout in the streams of that vicinity. He is on the go from daylight until near-daylight the next morning, getting the fry out to the streams just as rapidly as possible. He has a Ford truck on which he can stack about 25 cans at a time, and with the arrival of daylight he is off. The Sumpter trip is not the longest he has taken, but is one of the hardest made by any automobile alone. The Union fish are just right for planting at this time.

**Agrees with Sportsmen.**  
Mr. Bonney is in hearty accord with the sentiment of the Wing Fin & Fleetfoot resolution adopted recently which asked that no further planting of Eastern brook trout be made in streams, but that they be put into the mountain lakes. Mr. Bonney stated in an interview on the subject that some Eastern brook planted last year in Catherine creek near the hatchery, and farther up, too, had been pulled out this year, but that he had observed very few Eastern brook catches. He is of the opinion that the rainbow is the best stream fry for this vicinity.

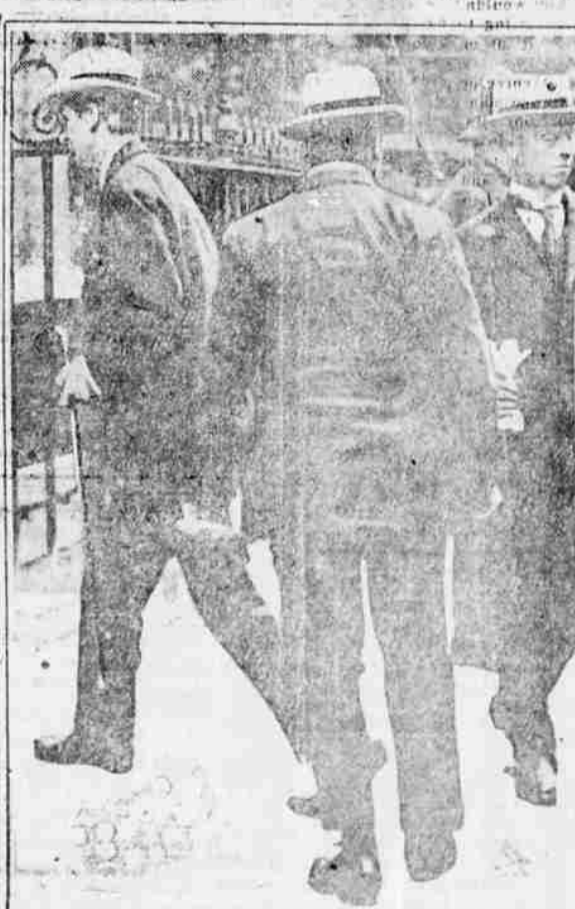
