ROCKEFELLER FOUNDATION WORKING ON PEST

Declares that Minnows in Bayou Will Eat the Eggs, But Grass Along Edge Must be Cropped

A third installment of the President's review of the activities of the Rockefeller Foundation made public today, tells of the progress in malaria control. One of the interesting features of the report is the part headed "Cows and Fish versus Mosquitoes." The article is as follows:

"The bayou is a sluggish stream carrying a good deal of vegetation and affording a favorite breeding place for the Anopheles. By the damming of a bayou and impounding the water for a stretch of several miles, a lake is formed. From this the vegetation is removed, and the top minnows are given their opportunity. The fish eat the mosquito eggs as fast as they are laid. Only one more obstacle is to be overcome. If the vegetation on the banks is permitted to grow freely it forms a protected zone in which eggs may be deposited beyond the reach of the top minnows.

"In the same way grass on the banks must be cleaned away if the breeding of the mosquitoes is to be prevented. To meet this need the strips along the bayou are turned into pasture land on which cattle are allowed to feed. The cows crop

the grass close along the low banks and leave the larvae an easy prey to the eager minnows. Thus the natural appetites of minnow and cow work together for the protection of man. Moreover the dairy and beef industry is fostered in a region which needs diversification of agriculture. It is too early to say whether this experiment will be successful; the indications so far are encouraging."

WALLOWA PEOPLE WILL BE THERE

GENERAL TREND IS "SPEND VACATION AT ROUND-UP"

Arthur Rudd Gingers up the Desire to See the Bucking Horses

That more Wallowa county folks will attend the Pendleton Round-up this year than ever before is the belief of Arthur Rudd of the University of Oregon who has been conducting a Round-up publicity campaign in the towns of the branch line for the past two weeks.

Wallowa county's crops are looking fine according to all reports and this, with the recent improvements in road conditions, will make it possible for a large number of farmers in that vicinity to go to the big show in their cars. The hay and grain show, which will be staged at Round-up time is also attracting considerable interest up the valley, and a number of displays are expected from the farms in that section.

Besides the displays which they will make at the farm show several Wallowaans are planning to take horses and riders to the Round-up itself. Several small Wild West exhibitions have been held at Joseph and other places along the line, during the past year. If indications are any criterion some of the 22 representatives from these contests may spring some surprises at "The Moccasin of the Buckaroo" in Pendleton when the show opens, September 22, according to Rudd.

Baker is the next place to get Round-up publicity. After spending a week or two there and in neighboring towns, Rudd plans to return to La Grande and launch the campaign here.

LAST YEAR'S CUT LARGEST

OREGON-WASHINGTON 1920 LUMBER CUT BIGGEST

Portland Office of the United States Forest Service Makes Report; Oregon's Cut Larger

The 1920 lumber cut of Oregon and Washington, according to reports given out by the Portland office of the United States Forest Service, was larger than that for any preceding year, amounting to 8,842 million board feet. Oregon's cut was 3,317 million, while that of Washington was 5,525 million feet. These reports are based on statistics compiled by the Forest Service in co-operation with the lumber industry. Four species made up the bulk of the cut: Douglas fir, 6,222 million; western yellow pine, 908 million; western hemlock, 584 million; and Sitka spruce, 357 million. Shingle production amounted to 5,136 million shingles, which is less than the 1919 cut, more than the 1918, and not much more than half that for 1909.

For the past several years production of lumber in Oregon and Washington has shown a steady increase. These states produced about 8 per cent more lumber in 1920 than in 1919; Oregon about 10 per cent more, Washington about 8 per cent more. A comparison of the complete statistics for 1920 with similar Forest Service statistics for 1918 shows that Oregon and Washington produced about 21 per cent more lumber in 1920 than in 1918; Oregon about 22 per cent more, Washington about 20 per cent more. Douglas fir production in these two states has increased from 3,873 million in 1915 to 6,222 million in 1920, western yellow pine from 338 million to 908 million, western hemlock from 368 million to 584 million, and spruce from 261 million to 357 million. Spruce production was highest in 1918, due to the use of this wood in aircraft construction.

MELON RECORD IS OUTSTRIPPED

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 2.—Out of the Imperial Valley alone enough cantaloupes have been shipped over Southern Pacific lines to allow one melon to each person in the United States and still have millions for distribution for a second helping.

Up to July 15 a total of 10,500 carloads of cantaloupes had been shipped to Eastern Markets. This means 156,000,000 melons.

Last year up to July 15, there had been shipped 8900 cars of cantaloupes, of 132,165,000 melons out of the Imperial Valley.

This year's immense crops were shipped in approximately 260 train-

loads, 50 cars to a train, which if placed one behind the other would extend for a distance of 100 miles. Picking and packing the crop was done in approximately 500 hours, the 156,000,000 cantaloupes requiring two individual handlings; first, the picking, then the packing.

According to the railroad officials 250 more cars of 2,712,500 melons, bringing the total number of cars to 10,750 will have been moved out of the Imperial Valley before the end of the season.

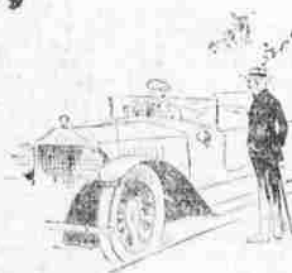
