Today he brought to the Observer an exhibit of vegetables that would cause the state fair to blush with envy. In the exhibit were as fine tomatoes as Eagle Valley ever produced. One measured 13 inches around and he had a flock of them. His offering of Astrakin apples was superb. They always told Harry that green peppers would not grow, but he has proved differently, for he presented the Observer with as fine green peppers as ever grew in Kentucky or in the Ozarks of Missouri. And cucumbers, say, those stonch-sachers that Harry raises are par excellence—one measures nine inches long and another nine inches around. His Kentucky Wonder beans measured between nine and ten inches in length and the Jersey Wakefield cabbage is fine. To make the exhibit show, he added a couple of goose-neck squashes, a couple of summer squashes, a line of first-class beets and a bouquet of carrots that are guaranteed to contain no alcohol.

Harry stands at the head of the class in this vegetable raising until some one comes forward with a better exhibit.

BIBLE STUDENT WILL LECTURE

S. H. Toutjian of Tarsus, Silesia, Asia Minor, (the birthplace of Apostle Paul), will deliver a lecture in La Grande at the City Hall (over fire station), Sunday, Aug. 7, 8:00 p. m., from the topic, "Christ Has Come, His Iron Rule Begun—Millions Now Living Will Never Die." Mr. Toutjian is an Armenian born and educated in this country a young man he took a further educational course in the schools of Indiana. His father being a minister in the Congregational Church, he was, of course, raised a Christian of that faith. "But," he says, "as I came to investigate the Bible I was convinced that so-called orthodox creedal teachings of both Catholic and Protestants were not in accord with the four-fold character of God, i. e. 'wisdom, justice, love and power', as set forth in the Bible. In searching for the truth my attention was called to the writings of the late Pastor C. T. Russell, whose presentations of the prophetic writings I found to be correct when compared with the original Hebrew and Greek texts. Also I was convinced that the God of Justice did not intend to destroy this earth, as taught by orthodox, but, on the contrary, to make it a place of permanent habitation for mankind, by reconstructing it to a paradisaic condition and restoring all the willing and obedient of mankind to the original purity and perfection, as was manifested in Adam." He says that he will positively prove from the Scriptures that the Great Messiah has returned, and will commence the construction phase of his kingdom in 1925.
