Will Inspect Waterworks—

City Commissioner David I. Stoddard and R. E. Koon, consulting engineer, will leave tomorrow for the Beaver creek dam for the purpose of making an inspection of the present water supply system. Among the features to be investigated, aside from an inspection of the present artificial works, is the possibility of securing water a short distance above the dam where it was reported during the 1919 shortage that plenty of water was to be found but evidently sunk into the ground. Measurements will be taken and if sufficient water is found there it is possible that a pipe line will be built from this point, which is about a quarter of a mile

above the dam, around the dam and lake and connecting with the present flow line.
