

STILL FIGHT IN RIGA DISTRICT

GUERRILLA WARFARE ON EIGHT FRONTS IS REPORT

Apparently War Has Not Subsidized In the Far East During the Summer

RIGA, Aug. 9.—(By Mail.)—Guerrilla warfare with small bands of irregular or peasant troops was being waged by the Bolsheviks on eight fronts, according to an official Bolshevik report of recent military operations, a copy of which has just reached Riga.

These irregulars, who interfere with collection of foodstuffs from the peasants and generally oppose the Bolsheviks whenever possible, are referred to by Moscow as "bandits." The report, dated June 19 and describing among its operations a conflict with some 600 horsemen belonging to "General" Antonoff's forces in the Tashoff government, was in direct contradiction to Moscow's claim, made in May, that Antonoff's campaigns had been liquidated.

In these fights, most of them consisting of long, running skirmishes, scores of villages have been devastated or sacked and many hundred persons killed. In the June 19 report, for instance, describing a fight on June 7 with this Antonoff detachment, the Bolsheviks claim to have killed 75 of their foe in one skirmish and to have caught 200 of them.

CHINA ASKS TREATY SIGNED

DEMANDS OF GERMANY MADE BY CHINESE GOVERNMENT

Although China Would Not Sign the Pact Herself She Wants Germany To Do So

BERLIN, Aug. 9.—(By Mail.)—Germany's refusal to subscribe again to the Versailles Treaty in its negotiations with the Chinese government has led to the completion of an agreement between the two governments which is designed to re-establish commercial relations pending the drafting of a permanent pact.

China's request that Germany reiterate its adherence to the Versailles Treaty was regarded by many here as somewhat remarkable, inasmuch as the Peking government refused to sign the treaty because of the Shantung provisions. It became known when the documents leading to the China-Germany agreement were laid before the Reichstag that Germany had refused to comply with China's request for a re-affirmation of Germany's adherence to the Versailles Treaty because Germany took the stand that such action might prejudice her position in case of a revision of the treaty.

In advising China of the unwillingness of Germany again to formally acknowledge the Versailles Treaty, Foreign Minister Simons wrote: "In agreement with the instructions of my government I have the honor to declare to you again that the German government cannot acknowledge the Versailles Treaty in general terms again, for such a step would be synonymous with the self-imposed acceptance of the treaty by Germany and would prejudice its later revision. But Germany will make no objections if China avails itself of Articles 128 to 134 of the treaty, also of certain other rights of the treaty, which are of importance for China, in the present form or in an altered form, in case a revision takes place."

The articles mentioned, 128 to 134, refer especially to China and provide that Germany shall surrender all concessions and special rights which it formerly enjoyed in China.

WALLOWA COUNTY DOING MUCH WORK

ENTERPRISE, Aug. 9.—The contract for the bridge over the creek in the new highway between Enterprise and Joseph was awarded by the state commission last week to Oscar Ohlberg for \$9,600. It is to be a wooden structure resting on concrete piers, two of which are to be permanent, and is to be finished by November first.

This bridge will cross the creek in D. A. Eggleston's field with a span of 140 feet, high above the stream. It was found that a permanent bridge of concrete or steel would cost at least \$18,000 and that much money was not available. So the cheaper structure was decided on. The bridge will be strong enough for any load and, if maintained properly, will last ten or twenty years.

On this section of the highway the earth grade is nearly finished and rock has been spread most of the length of Creighton lane. Until the bridge is finished the rock for the lower section will have to be hauled to the grade by way of the old county roads, a longer distance than the direct new highway.

At other parts of the valley job the work is moving along steadily. Only about two miles of the canyon road remains to be surfaced, and the remainder of the road is in such good condition that drivers find it a real joy.

The brush has been cleared off the route of the new grade up Wallowa hill and the earth work has started. This will be available before the latter part of next autumn.

However, they concluded they had been busy in parting and remarried. Again they proceeded to the divorce court and were parted Aug. 17, 1920. Now it appears that action was not final, as they obtained a license last week for their third marriage. Justice Conaway now counts on them as regular patrons entitled to reduced rates.

Officials Inspect Railroad

F. M. Finch, the new general superintendent of the O.-W. railroad, arrived yesterday in a special car on a tour of inspection of the Wallowa county branch. He made the return trip to La Grande ahead of the passenger train in a speeder. Accompanying him were H. A. Roberts, chief engineer of the system, and W. Bolons, division superintendent. Mr. Finch succeeded M. J. Buckley as general superintendent. He formerly was on the Camas Prairie line, where Walter Spear, Enterprise local agent, was acquainted with him.

CLAIM IT IS AN OPEN SHOP FIGHT

MEETING OF TYPOGRAPHICAL UNION IS WATCHED.

Secretary Hayes Declares Non-Union People in Other Trades are Taking Hand.

QUEBEC, Aug. 9.—The fight of the International Typographical Union for the forty-four hour week has broadened into a battle against the open-shop, says Secretary-Treasurer J. W. Hayes, of Indianapolis, in his annual report to its convention opening here today.

"The printers' union," Mr. Hayes said, "is in the throes of the most strenuous and what promises to be a considerably drawn out battle for the establishment of printing office conditions to which it is justly entitled by reason of an agreement which it made with employing printers more than two years ago."

"I am of the opinion that had the question of the forty-four hour week been left solely to the printing office employers and officers of printing trades unions there would have been little, if any, difficulty in putting it into effect on May 1, 1921. However, non-union employers in other industries evidently determined that were the forty-four hour week to be universally established in the printing business without difficulty it would set an example to workers in other industries which would induce them to make similar demands, and would establish a precedent hard to overcome."

"It is undoubtedly for this reason that these non-union employers started a publicity campaign against the idea of shortening hours of labor in any industry and established a boycott upon all union printing offices agreeing to work under forty-four hour week conditions. It was this threat of boycott that induced employing printers to start a campaign in opposition to the carrying out of the agreement."

Mr. Hayes declared he had "not the least hesitancy in saying that this fight will be won by the International Typographical Union."

He added that the union was entitled to the conditions it sought also because of the conservative position it took during the world war period when members of the typographical union accepted smaller increases and did more to keep industry moving than did the members and representatives of any other organization in the country.

KIT CARSON CUT NAME ON A TREE

AND NOW THERE IS TO BE A MONUMENT UNVEILED

Historic People Also Decide to Place John Brown Tree in Hall of Fame.

CARSON CITY, Nev., Aug. 9.—Unveiling a monument here, the Native Sons of California on Sunday will mark the site of the "Kit Carson Tree." The California tree, a pine on which Kit Carson carved his name in 1844 when acting as a guide to Col. Fremont, has been given a place in the Hall of Fame for trees with a history by the American Forestry Association, following its nomination by F. N. Fletcher, of Carson City, Nev.

It was on this trip that Col. Fremont discovered Lake Tahoe. The pine was in a pass through the Sierra Nevada Mountains. The tree was cut down in 1888 by William Thornbury and J. F. O'Gorman, the association's data shows, and the trunk with Carson's name cut in it was moved to Sutter's Fort, where it may now be seen. A full account of the tree's history has been sealed up in a container in the monument by Native Sons.

The hickory tree that grew on the fireplace of the Kansas log cabin of John Brown of Ossawatimie and Harper's Ferry has been nominated for a place in the Hall of Fame by Miss Eleanor M. Freeman, of Seattle, Wash. In 1875 Miss Freeman's father visited the John Brown farm, accompanied by a son-in-law of Brown. Only the log foundation of the cabin was left, but from the fireplace was growing a hickory tree which Mr. Freeman trimmed and from a branch made a cane, which his daughter now has.

AURELIA MINE RE-LOCATED

Party From Pasco, Wash., Looking Over Mining Property

H. H. Sanders, R. E. Madden and R. E. Ralk, of Pasco, Wash., were in this vicinity last week for the purpose of relocating the Aurelia mine, located between the Camp Carson and the Indian mines, says the North Powder News.

The claims held by these people are the Ivanhoe and the Silver Wreath claims, and it may be that gold will again be taken out in quantities, if the plans of these gentlemen work out. Actual work on the properties is to begin about August 6.

Like the Camp Carson mine these claims have been neglected, but since gold has again become a profitable commodity, interest in these places has revived. There is no question as to gold being on either of these places. It is simply a question of proper handling and saving of the flake gold in the Carson properties. The Aurelia mine is a quartz proposition and the men above named are satisfied enough with the prospects to go ahead and start work.

M. W. Rose, who is interested in the Camp Carson mines, brought in a fine sample of gold and platinum and claims that with the aid of his machine most of this can be saved, and that his company is going ahead at full speed putting in pipe and fixing roads so that they can run full blast next spring.

This means that North Powder has a splendid opportunity to pick up both in commercial lines and to some extent in population. The development of these properties is a big thing and every man in this town should boost these propositions to the limit.

The big Thiet river irrigation project is another big item for North Powder to consider. It will mean many dollars to the merchants to have this project go through. There is plenty of opportunity in North Powder for all—and a little boasting of the natural resources surrounding the town will spell prosperity for this town and all its people.

New Teachers Named For Wallowa Schools

WALLOWA, Aug. 9.—Several new teachers have been added to the faculty of the Wallowa high school. Miss Helen Bobbie of O. A. C. will take charge of the home economics department. She was assistant in the chemistry department at O. A. C. for two years and as a teacher of home economics she has made an excellent record.

Mrs. Edna Griffin, assistant principal of the high school, taught in the high school at Ontario for eight years. She is considered a woman of unusual ability. She is a graduate of a California normal school and of the University of California. Besides being a teacher of history and mathematics she has taken an interest in debating and oratory and last year, while at Lostine, had charge of the work in debating there.

The situation has been aggravated by the enormous increase in production during the past few years, as well as by the serious shortage of transportation equipment."

Specialists of the Bureau of Markets and Crop Estimates, United States Department of Agriculture, thus sum up the results of their study of methods and practices which have given the greatest satisfaction in commercial operations.
