CORVALLIS MAN GIVES IDEAS

Comments Observer's Reply to Dean Straub—Claims Oregon Can Take Pointers from Canada.

That the Observer's stand on the higher institutions of learning in this state is meeting with approval in many quarters is shown by the numerous telephone calls, personal visits from people, and letters commending the frank manner in which the matter is being discussed.

A Corvallis resident, where the Oregon Agricultural College is located, has written us a warm letter of support from which we take the following extracts:

"I wish to congratulate the Observer upon the fearless stand it is taking in the matter of higher education and to say to you that the great trouble has been in people not wanting to be counted on a proposition which they know to be unsatisfactory. I sincerely hope the Observer's articles may start a general statewide agitation to do away with the waste in higher education and give the boys and girls a square deal."

"Being a resident of Corvallis and seeing much that goes on at the big school I have thought a great deal about the work being done at O. A. C. When in Portland once upon a time I heard the Minister of Agriculture from Manitoba in a speech before the Portland Commercial club and the general scheme he outlined has never gotten quite out of my mind."

Could borrow basic principles.

"He outlined their plan of agricultural education and to my mind we could borrow certain basic principles to the great advantage of our agricultural education. They have what they call Agricultural High Schools so situated over the province that no student is required to be more than fifty miles from his home. There are no educational qualifications necessary to gain admission to these agricultural schools, the term of training is short, special lines are taught which have especial value in the communities where the schools are located. In a location such as Union county the schools would probably cover as wide a range as anywhere in the state. The students are trained in the selection and raising of seeds, breeding and care of live stock, in rudiments of machinery and blacksmithing, in horticulture and probably dairying. The students are not taken so far from home that they lose interest in them. They are not burdened with a lot of clap trap stuff which will prove of no practical value, except the alleged value of training their minds, and they go back on the farm before the home ties and influences are severed."

We Turn Our Professors. "He stated the difference between their plan of teaching agriculture and ours was that they added the finishing touch to the men and women who were going to become agriculturists whereas in a school conducted as ours is conducted, we turn out professors of agriculture. He knew the situation better he might have added that a very large part of our students are graduated as pharmacists, electrical engineers, and in other lines which have no possible relation to agriculture, such as logging engineers, handling manufacturing timber through the testing laboratories and such like."

Perhaps these special lines should be taught in the State institution and if so I believe O. A. C. is as good a place as we have, but as far as Oregon agriculture is concerned the Oregon Agricultural College is a misnomer when relation is desired to practical agriculture on the land. Short Term Course Praised. "The short term work during the winter has a far greater value to Oregon agriculture than the regular college course. These short term courses take and train actual agriculturists for a few weeks in the winter and are undoubtedly of much benefit."

Short Open Season On Pheasants Tends Towards Conserving. Reports Indicate That Hunting Will Be Better Than It Has Been For Many Years.

According to a statement made by A. E. Burghoff, state game warden, in the Oregonian of yesterday China pheasants and bob white quail will be more plentiful in Union and Umatilla counties this year than for several years.

The open season for China pheasants in Union, Walla Walla, Umatilla, Malheur, Baker and Grant counties is from the first Sunday in October to the second Sunday in October, inclusive.

"We feel that the shortened season in effect this year will tend to keep the pheasants increasing until they eventually will reach the number here before promiscuous hunting was allowed," Mr. Burghoff said. "This will not be possible, however, unless the short season is continued."

"The present favorable condition was brought about releasing birds from the game farm last year after the closed season, so that all had a chance to procreate before the open hunting season."

IMPROVEMENT WORK HALTED

At the election Tuesday an amendment was presented which would have made certain changes in the methods now in use in making improvement assessments as well as one increasing the maximum rate of interest to six per cent. Both were decisively defeated. Both were put on the ballot partly in order that improvement work may be done this year which had been petitioned for by the property owners.

The failure of these amendments to pass makes it practically impossible to do this work. The present charter provisions provide for issuing bonds not to exceed the cost of the work, this making the sale of bonds below par—it was stated at the meeting that 85 would be all the bonds would be likely to bring now—impossible. The only way of doing improvement work under the present law is to have the contractor take the bonds in payment. The experience of last year shows that there are no contractors who want to take this chance. It was stated at the meeting. When the improvement assessments on a number of districts came up the matter was put over again without action.

"Let the improvements wait until the people are ready to stand behind the commission," was the sentiment of the commission on the matter.

The first objection to further delay in improvements came at this time when a citizen in precinct No. 12 wanted to know whether the citizens along Victory Way must tolerate an open ditch in front of their property when the sidewalk was to cover the ditch. A petition for sidewalks in this section is among those being held up.
