WOMAN SWINGS HOUSE GAVEL

First Time in History a Woman Presides Over House in Congress

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 12.—When Representative Alice Robertson presided over the House recently during adoption of a resolution authorizing the United States to participate in the 100th anniversary of Peruvian independence, Ambassador P. A. Pavez of Peru sent to the first woman who has ever swung the House gavel a great bouquet of American beauty roses.

Republican Leader Mondell stepped proceedings in the House to spread in the record the official letter which accompanied the flowers for Oklahoma's Republican woman member.

"My Dear Congresswoman," Ambassador Pavez wrote. "For the first time in the annals of history a lady representative in the parliament of a great nation became speaker pro tempore, the motion under debate being the passage of a joint resolution of the Senate and House of representatives of the United States, authorizing the president to appoint a special mission to represent the government and people of the United States at the celebration of the one hundredth anniversary of the proclamation of independence in the sister republic of Peru."

"As the representative of the Peruvian government and nation in this capital, I wish to express to you on this day my gratification in that the first event of a lady presiding over one of the branches of the legislature should have coincided with the taking of a vote in reference to a participation in my country's celebration. I wish in the name of the Peruvian government and people to present these flowers to you, bound with the colors of Peru, as a token of our respect and admiration for the great American democracy, the beacon light which guides the other free nations of America."

BIG PRIZES OFFERED AUTOMOBILE RACERS

SANTA ROSA, Cal., Aug. 12.—Cash prizes and points toward the 1921 racing championship of the American Automobile Association will be fought for in a 150-mile race on a new automobile speedway at Cotati, near here, next Sunday by eleven drivers, most of whom are noted for their work in the fast bowls.

Eddie Hearne, Joe Thomas, Roscoe Scales, Tommy Milon, Eddie Miller, Tom Alley, Ira Vail and others are on the list of drivers expected. The winner will receive \$5,000.

The new Cotati bowl is the same size as the big bowl at Beverly Hills, Los Angeles, and was built by Jack Prince, the designer of the auto track. It is one mile and one quarter in length, with a 100-foot straightaway and but two abrupt turns, making it unnecessary for the drivers to slacken speed in making turns.

DYING STATEMENT OF HER GUILT

SPOKANE, Aug. 12.—A purported dying statement of a woman who is reported to have declared she shot and killed Rena Hutchinson, general secretary of the Y. M. C. A., here in 1916, was said by the police today to shed light on a murder mystery which baffled all officers of the law for fifteen years.

According to a statement made by a resident of Vancouver, B. C., the woman declared she shot Hutchinson through mistake thinking he was a banker of Spokane who was formerly the head of a bank in Vancouver which failed, causing her to lose her money.

She did not learn her mistake until, after leaving the city and she was afraid to return. The name of the intended victim and the woman who made the dying statement have not been made public by the officers.

SUPERDEADNAUGHT TO BE LAUNCHED

MARE ISLAND, Cal., Aug. 12.—America's newest battleship, the USS Nevada, thought Cal. will be commissioned at Mare Island Navy Yard here tomorrow noon, it was announced recently.

Ceremonies of commissioning will be simple. It is expected, Commandant E. A. Beach of the yard will read his orders authorizing him to commission the ship. Captain H. J. Ziegler will follow with his orders instructing him to take command and the flag will be raised.

The California will leave for San Francisco August 17.

NEW MEXICO'S INCOME TAX IS ON INCREASE

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Aug. 12.—Increase in income tax receipts from New Mexico of more than 800 per cent is shown in recent figures made public by B. C. Hernandez, United States Internal Revenue collector for the state. In 1910 the income tax payers paid \$20,935 and in 1919 they paid \$274,478. The number of tax payers increased from 815 to 10,757 in the same period. The 1920-21 figures will surpass those for 1919, according to Robert L. Thornton, chief of the income tax division of the internal revenue office here.

PUREBRED SIRES ARE INCREASING RAPIDLY

Have Proved Worth for Improving Range Herds.

Scrub Bull Has Been Blacklisted on Big National Forest Pastures—Great Improvement Seen in Grade of Sires.

Purebred bulls have proved their value for improving range herds, and the number being bought in the cow country of the West is rapidly increasing each year, according to reports to the United States Department of Agriculture. The scrub bull is now blacklisted on the big national forest pastures.

During the season of 1919 three local live stock associations, the members of which use the ranges of the Sierra National Forest in California, adopted rules for the purchase of purebred bulls. Under a special rule each association was required to place on the range a sufficient number of purebred Hereford, Shorthorn, or Aberdeen-Angus bulls. A committee to

purchase and pass upon the credentials of each animal to be turned loose on the ranges was appointed.

Under this plan, during the grazing season of 1920, 105 Herefords, 97 Shorthorns, and six Aberdeen-Angus bulls were purchased by the stockmen through their associations and placed upon the range. It is estimated that at the end of the season of 1920 the stockmen had not less than 200 registered bulls on their ranges, resulting in a great improvement in the grade of steers turned out.

The Forest Service of the United States Department of Agriculture assists these local associations in enforcing the rules which require that the same kind and grade of bulls be placed on the same range. Permits to graze on the national forest pastures are refused those who do not conform to the association's ruling and who have not paid their share toward the purchase of the association bulls.

POOR EGGS INCREASE PRICES

Percentage of Spoiled Product Shipped to Markets Is Very High and Discourages Trade.

In a shipment of three cases, or 90 dozen eggs, recently received by a Washington (D. C.) commission firm, 187 dozen were condemned by the local health department as unfit for food. The percentage of bad eggs shipped into the markets is very high, reducing trade and discouraging consumption, say specialists of the bureau of markets of the United States Department of Agriculture.

If a few eggs in the dozen are bad the housewife pays exorbitant prices for the sound ones. The dealer always prefers to handle good eggs, for spoiled ones injure his business reputation. A deduction for spoiled eggs also makes the shopper feel that he is not being treated in good faith by the commission merchant.

Bad eggs then are a loss to everyone who handles them. Every egg marketed should be of unquestionable quality.

EASTERN ROADS REJECT WAGE

NEW YORK, Aug. 12.—Wage requests presented a week ago to eastern railroads by the four railroad brotherhoods and the switchmen's union were rejected by presidents of the line at a conference here Thursday.

SEEKS TO CAPTURE GAME FOR MUSEUM

JUNEAU, Alaska, Aug. 12.—Theodore R. Hubback, retired rubber plantation owner, journeyed recently from the Malay peninsula to Alaska to hunt big game.

While in the north Mr. Hubback will seek specimens of game for the United States Biological Survey and endeavor to capture sheep for the British Museum.

While in the King Cove district of

Alaska, on his way to Juneau, Mr. Hubback, with his guides, saw at least 100 brown bears, he said. He added that he was forced to shoot one eight feet in length as it attacked the party.

The Rainy Pass country north of here, into which Mr. Hubback expects to go with his party, is a virgin region, no hunters or prospectors having yet penetrated into its wilds. The party hopes to find there moose, bear, mountain sheep and caribou.

For two months the hunters will remain in the Rainy Pass region and

will come out over the snow in October, bringing specimens by dog team.

Mr. Hubback said while here that he has hunted in many parts of the world. Once before, in 1918, he visited Alaska and shot brown bear on the Kenai peninsula.
