SOUTH MAY SOLVE PROBLEM

Minister Sees Hope for Settling Race Question in Near Future

LAKE JUNALASKA, N. C., Aug. 15.—The next big forward step in the solution of the race question will come from the South the Rev. W. W. Aloys and unaltered gratitude for all they Commission on Inter-Racial Co-operation, predicted at the Laymen's Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church South.

"I say this with absolutely due regard for the friendship of the Negro in other sections and with the fullest and unstinted gratitude for all they have done in philanthropy and education, in church and state," the Rev. Mr. Alexander said. "Nevertheless the next big step in the inter-racial readjustment is to come from the South, and the reason for this is perfectly apparent.

"The South can afford to do it, and what is a great deal better, there is a growing conviction here based upon a sense of justice and fair play for all men. Then, too, the South has social prestige to do this. The social question figures largely in the race question. So the South can when it will, take the leadership in international co-operation.

"I believe the South will assume this leadership, with the same sort of price and determination as it led the Nation in the overthrow of the rum traffic.

"It has been the universal opinion of those who have come in close touch with the question that Negro leaders do not desire or seek social equality. They have asked for police protection, better housing, better sanitary and living conditions, better educational facilities, and a chance to develop into useful American citizens with every determination to maintain their own social life and the purity of the two racial stocks.

"The reasonableness and intelligence of Negro leaders greatly encouraged the white men who have come in contact with them. The fact that Southern white men and women have manifested their interest in Negro welfare has gone far to allay the unrest and pessimism which was so rapidly spreading through great sections of the Negro leadership in America."

PAN-PACIFIC TEACHERS MEET

Educators From U. S. and China and Japan Assemble

HONOLULU, T. H., Aug. 15.—Japanese, Chinese and American educators of note gathered, together with others from further countries touched by the Pacific Ocean, in preparation for the opening of the Pan-Pacific Educational Conference here.

Delegates from America's western states outnumbered all the rest Japan standing second with a strong showing. The conference runs two weeks.

The visitors were guests at a banquet tendered by the Pan-Pacific Union, of which Governor W. R. Farrington of the Hawaiian territory is president. Previously the educators were shown through the Bernice Pauahi Bishop museum here and attended a reception given at the University of Hawaii by the regents and faculty of the university.

The educational conference is the second of a series of meetings sponsored by the Pan-Pacific Union. The first of these was the Pan-Pacific Scientific Congress last year. Others in prospect are Pan-Pacific, commercial, financial and health conferences.

SHOOTS AT HIS WIFE AND SELF

Pendleton Man Said to Have Been Drinking When Deed Committed

PENDLETON, Aug. 13.—Thwarted in an attempt to effect a reconciliation with his former wife, Charles A. Weatherford is lying in St. Anthony's hospital with a severe wound inflicted when he turned a gun on himself and Mrs. Oda Weatherford was burned on the neck by a shot from her former husband's gun which it is believed was meant to kill her. When Weatherford recovers, which is believed to be only a matter of a few weeks, he will be faced by a charge of assault with intent to kill, the local district attorney's office having issued instructions yesterday upon his release from the hospital.

The attempted suicide and alleged attempted murder which occurred about 8 o'clock Thursday night at Mrs. Weatherford's home at 126 Thompson street is believed to have been a result of an attack of temper coupled with heavy drinking on the part of Weatherford.
