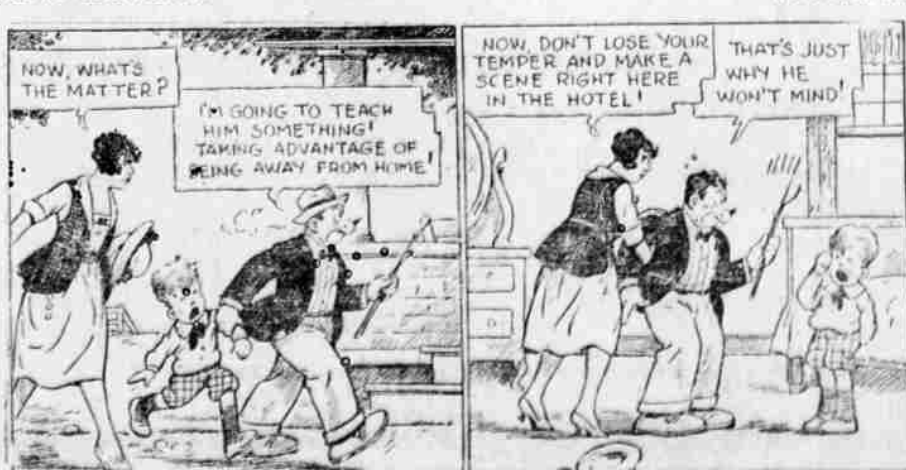
DEADLOCK MET IN RUSSIA
