JERSEYS INVADE CROOK COUNTY

Ranchers Ship in Milk Cows to Feed Surplus Alfalfa Returns Expected

Observer's Salem Bureau.
SALEM, Ore., Aug. 15.—(Special.)—Transfer by purchase of 100 head of registered Jersey cattle from the Willamette valley to the Crook county district in Crook county is the way the people of that project have decided to solve the alfalfa hay problem, which has reached a serious stage. The cattle will be taken to Crook county from Western Oregon about September 1.

The Crook district has a great plenty of alfalfa hay and the settlers there are utterly unable to sell it, though they have been offering it at the ruinously low price of \$5 a ton. However, W. L. Tucker, Crook county agent, and other leaders in that district, have concluded that the equivalent of \$20 a ton can be received by the farmers if the hay is fed to dairy cows and turned into butter, which always has a ready sale. So that is the plan that has been decided on.

The cattle will be selected from the best Jersey herds in Marion, Polk, Yamhill and other Central Willamette valley counties, by Mr. Tucker and by Professor E. B. Flitts of Oregon Agricultural college. They will be sold to the settlers in the district. Bankers have offered their co-operation, and will back the farmers in paying for the dairy animals.

Information of this unique move on the part of the Oregon settlers was brought to Salem by Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian. Dr. Lytle says the Crook county farmers want animals of large size and this will be taken into consideration when the purchases are made. The Jersey breed is considered the best for butter production.

The same method of utilizing alfalfa hay also is being used in Malheur, Union and other Eastern Oregon counties.

MAKE BIG MONEY FROM TURKEYS SEAT SALE FOR ROUNDUP IS SET

Crook Co. Woman Clears \$1600 on 300 Birds in One Season
Irwin's Cowboy and Cowgirl Show Will Give a Great Program

SALEM, Aug. 15.—(Special.)—A total of \$1600 in earnings from 300 turkeys was the phenomenal record made in 1920 by Mrs. Smith, one of the settlers in the Crook county district of Crook county, according to Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian who recently has returned after an official visit into that part of the state.

Dr. Lytle is of the opinion that the livestock and poultry business can be made a big thing in that district, as well as in others in Oregon, if the settlers will apply themselves to work it out. Crook county, says the veterinarian, is particularly fortunate in having as county agent, W. L. Tucker, who has been highly successful in working out the problems of the farmers.

Mrs. Smith, whose initials Dr. Lytle does not remember, is offered as an example of what can be accomplished. She also has hogs, sheep and cows, and the state veterinarian believes she has been as successful with these as with the turkeys. She has not found it necessary to buy feed and consequently has been able to fatten her livestock and turkeys on a profit basis.

While corn is considered excellent turkey food, it cannot be produced successfully in Crook county because of the high altitude. However, sunflowers serve the purpose and can be grown successfully in that part of the state. Sunflowers also can be made into ensilage and fed to the livestock.

Last Granddaughter of Declaration of Independence Signer

Miss Ellery of New Port Has Many Historic Mementos in Her Possession

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 15.—Henrietta Channing Ellery of this city has the distinction of being the last surviving grandchild of a signer of the Declaration of Independence. She is the granddaughter of William Ellery.

Miss Ellery was born April 8, 1838 and has lived her entire life in Newport. Neither she nor her sister Mary, long since deceased, ever married. For a great many years they made their home in the Ellery home, on Thames street, the home of their grandfather, but this home is no longer standing.

The Newport chapter of the Daughters of the American Revolution is named after this signer of the Declaration of Independence. It was at the invitation of Miss Ellery that the chapter was formed in Newport in 1896. She has always been deeply interested in the chapter and kept up her membership in it, attending all meetings, as long as her health permitted.

The trunk that William Ellery took with him from Newport to Washington when he went there to sign the Declaration is in possession of the D. A. R. chapter, a gift from the Misses Ellery.

Opposite the old homestead the family owned a three cornered piece of land at the apex of which stood the Liberty Tree. A few years ago Miss Ellery presented this land to the city for park purposes. It has been improved, beautified, and the city has honored the donor by christening it "Ellery Park."

FLUME MAY BE REPLACED SOON

NORTH POWDER, Aug. 15.—J. P. Laidridge, general manager of the Eastern Oregon Light & Power company has made the announcement that the company is contemplating the replacement of 2 1/2 miles of their Rock Creek flume. According to Mr. Laidridge, if it is decided to go ahead with the work, it will be necessary to close down the Rock Creek plant for probably 45 days during which time the steam plant in Baker will be operated. IRISH GET SAME OFFER AS CANADA

by an earnest desire to end the unhappy divisions between Great Britain and Ireland which have produced so many conflicts in the past and which have once more shattered the peace and well-being of Ireland. At the present time they long with his majesty, the king, in the words of his gracious speech in Ireland last month, for a satisfactory solution of those age-long Irish problems which for generations embarrassed our forefathers and which now weigh heavily upon us, and they wish to do their utmost to secure that every man of Irish birth should work in loyal co-operation with the free communities on which the British empire is based. They are convinced that the Irish people may find as worthy and complete an expression of their political and spiritual ideals within the empire as any of the numerous and varied nations, united in allegiance to his majesty's throne, and they desire such consummation, not only for the welfare of Great Britain and Ireland and the empire as a whole, but also for the cause of peace and harmony throughout the world.

Irishmen Everywhere Suffer.
There is not a part of the world where Irishmen have made their homes but suffers from our ancient feud. No part of it but looks to this meeting between the British government and the Irish leaders to give these feuds in a new understanding, favorable and satisfactory to all the people involved.

The free nations which compose the British empire are drawn from many races with different histories, traditions and ideals. In the Dominion of Canada, the British and French have long forgotten the bitter conflicts which divided their ancestors in South Africa, the Transvaal republic and the Orange Free State have joined with two British colonies to make a great self-governing union under his majesty's sway. The British people cannot believe that when Canada and South Africa with equal or even greater difficulties have so signally succeeded, Ireland will fail, and they are determined that so far as they themselves can assure it, nothing shall hinder Irish statesmen from joining together to build up an Irish state

in free and willing co-operation with the other peoples of the empire."

SURPLUS OF GRAIN CROP IN OREGON

war surplus was only 78.8 millions. The export surplus of the entire country is estimated at 200 million bushels compared with an average of 176.5 million bushels during the past ten years.

Although the American crop will be above the average according to indications when the report was made, the Indian crop is much below according to the official report which places the estimate at 253 million bushels, which is less than the estimated requirement for home consumption.

Big Australian Crop.
Australia expects to have a surplus of 96 million bushels, compared with 44 million bushels for the ten-year period of 1909-18. The exportable surplus is expected to be large, being estimated at 121 million bushels compared with a 96 million bushel average for the past ten years.

In concluding the report says: "The export of Canadian wheat by the tariff should mean a strong premium on hard spring wheats, for these imports have been for seed and blending purposes."

"Movement of wheat to terminals this year is much heavier than at the corresponding period last year. One report from Kansas states that about 50 per cent of the wheat harvested is being shipped immediately to market."

In discussing the work of the co-operative grain growers, Mr. Reynolds stated that warehouses in all parts of this and other countries were accepting grain from members for storage and that investigation showed that where reports had been circulated that warehouses in particular sections had refused to take the grain of members, these had been shown to be false. The association is loaning members 65 cents a bushel on their warehouse receipts now, Mr. Reynolds stated.

tlement of the long outstanding dif-

ference with which Great Britain has been confronted. We are busily engaged in ratifying our part of this solemn bargain, while the Irishmen outside the northern area, who in the past have chosen to repudiate the government of Ireland act and press Great Britain for wider powers. To join in such pressure is repugnant to the people of northern Ireland.

"In the further interest of peace we therefore respectfully decline. We are determined not to interfere with the terms of settlement between us, but to safeguard the ties that bind us to Great Britain and empire, to insure that we are not prejudiced by any terms entered into between them and Mr. De Valera and to maintain the just equality exhibited throughout the government of Ireland act.

Ready to Join Conference.
"Our acceptance of your original invitation to meet in conference in London holds good and if at any time our assistance again is desired, we are available. But I feel bound to acquaint you that no meeting is possible between De Valera and myself until he recognizes that northern Ireland will not submit to

any other authority than that of his majesty, the king, and the parliament of the United Kingdom, and admits the sanctity of the existing power and privileges of the parliament of northern Ireland.

"In conclusion, let me assure you that peace is as earnestly desired by my government and myself as by you and yours, and although we have nothing left to give away we are prepared when you and Mr. De Valera arrive at a satisfactory settlement to co-operate with south Ireland on equal terms for the future welfare of our common country. In order to avoid any misunderstanding or misrepresentation of our views, I intend to publish this letter when your proposals are made public."

Secretary of War Weeks has authorized the discharge by corps area and division commanders of all enlisted men who may apply for discharge during July without prejudice to their rights to travel pay.
