

## CONDUCT TRIAL BY TELEPHONE

Forest Service Finds a Novel Method of Trying Out Interstate Difficulty

POTLAND, Ore., Aug. 15.—E. H. McDaniels, Forest Supervisor of the Siskiyou National Forest, at Grants Pass, Oregon, has reported to the local Forest Service office the first case on record of an interstate forest fire trespass trial being conducted by telephone.

A careless camper from Grants Pass was returning from Crescent City, California, and left his camp fire burning near the Gasquet Ranger station, inside the State of California. The fire was reported to Forest Ranger G. S. Case who headed off the careless camper by phone, overtook and arrested him, but allowed him to go with the promise that upon arrival in Grants Pass he would report at once to Forest Supervisor McDaniels and plead guilty, which the trespasser did.

Since the violation occurred in California it was necessary for a justice of the peace in that state to try the case, also it may be remarked that the minimum fine in California for leaving an unextinguished camp fire is fifty dollars, while in Oregon the minimum is only five dollars. Up on the trespasser reporting to him, Supervisor McDaniels got all the interested parties on the phone and the four-cornered phone trial began. McDaniels was in his office in Grants Pass, the careless camper was at his home at the same place, Forest Ranger Case was at the Gasquet Ranger station inside the California line, and the Justice of the Peace in Crescent City, California. Thereupon the following four-cornered phone conversation ensued:

"All right, Mr. Case, go ahead and tell the Judge about it," began McDaniels.

Here followed crackles, squeaks and buzzes for about 80 cents worth of time, representing the Ranger telling about the burning camp fire, and murmurs and hisses showing where the Judge came in.

Ranger Case then said, "All right, I've stated the case."

Supervisor McDaniels then asks the violator, "You have heard the charge, do you plead guilty?"

The prisoner at one end of the phone begins, "Yes, sir, I left the

fire burning, but you see, Judge, it's like this—"

## Pioneers of 1844 Have Family Reunion At Jefferson Home

Family of Thomas Holt Meets With More Than 75 Attending—Settled on Donation Claim.

JEFFERSON, Aug. 15.—More than 75 relatives and descendants of Thomas Holt met in the Miller grove at Jefferson Sunday for their second annual family reunion.

Thomas Holt was one of the early pioneers of Oregon, having crossed the plains with an ox-team in 1844 and, like most of the early pioneers, he fought in the Indian wars and he also spent some time in the mines of California in 1848 and 1849. He married Liane Caldwell who, with her parents, crossed the plains in 1846, coming part way by ox-team and the remainder by foot.

Mr. and Mrs. Holt settled on a donation land claim about one mile south of Jefferson, where they raised a large family of 12 children, 10 of whom still survive their parents, who have long since passed to their reward. Seven of the children, together with their families, were present at the reunion.

Among the descendants attending was Miss Lucile Hudson of North Powder.

## LA GRANDE HAS SMALL CITY DEBT

necessary to reconstruct the present water system so as to make it serve for another three to five years, the per capita debt would be only about \$90, less than any of the other cities mentioned above.

The voters of La Grande, or that small number going to the polls at the recent charter amendment election, voted down the provision proposing to change the limit of the bonded indebtedness from ten per cent to fifteen per cent of assessed valuation. This leaves La Grande among the few cities of any consequence having so low a limit. The tables prepared by the Oregon Voter do not give the limit on the bonded indebtedness allowed by the various charters but twenty-eight cities have bonded themselves for more than 20 per cent of their assessed valuation, Prineville with 67 per cent leading all, Seaside being second with 54 per cent and Central Point third with 42 per cent.

The conclusion reached by a study of the statistics, especially in relation to the water supply situation that will be presented to the voters this fall in the form of a bond issue as follows: La Grande today has a municipal debt per capita far below that of other cities of its size. Its bonding limit is much less, and although preliminary estimates show that the bonding limit will not be reached by any means the present bonding limit would still keep the city's debt below that of other cities in La Grande's class.
