

WILL AID THE DISABLED MEN

Traveling Units for Benefit
of War Injured to Cover
Three States

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 17.—Help is to be taken direct to disabled ex-service men of California, Nevada and Arizona by two traveling Contact Units, consisting of representatives of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, the Federal Board for Vocational Education and the United States Public Health Service.

For the next six weeks about forty towns in the three states will be visited by the units, each made up of eight workers, and the ex-service men will be asked to meet the units and present their requests for vocational training, compensation and medical treatment. The requests will then be sent to San Francisco for approval and to Washington for final award.

Transportation will be provided the disabled men from their homes to the nearest towns in which the units will stop. Claims for medical, dental and surgical treatment will be settled on the spot and immediate provision made for needy veterans.

Co-operating with the three federal agencies all volunteer veteran relief organizations will assist in going over the districts to locate and assist disabled veterans.

The following organizations will help: The American Legion, Veterans of Foreign Wars, Disabled American Veterans of the World War, Disabled Veterans of the World War, Military Order of the World War, Red Cross, Knights of Columbus, Salvation Army, Y. M. C. A. and the Jewish Welfare Board.

RAILROADS MUST CANCEL CLAIMS

Senator Lenroot Says Roads
Must Give in if They Are
To Be Funded.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—(Special Correspondence.)—Senator Irvine L. Lenroot of Wisconsin insists that if the government is going to permit the railroads to fund their indebtedness to the treasury they must agree to abandon for all time their claims for payment on account of inefficiency of labor during the period of federal control. Those claims total between \$700,000,000 and \$8,000,000,000. They have been temporarily waived, but the roads have reserved the right to press them in the courts at a later date. Senator Lenroot believes it

should be made a matter of affirmative law that any road that refuses to agree never to prosecute those claims shall not share in the proposed funding of its debt to the government. Mr. Lenroot has put his proposal into the form of an amendment to the bill granting authority for the funding and will endeavor to have it incorporated as a part of that measure. It is known that other senators are with Senator Lenroot in the matter, and it is rumored that they will refuse support to the funding bill unless such a provision is included in it.

A Reasonable Suggestion.
Secretary of Labor Davis has asked Congress to enact an amendment to the percentage immigration law passed last spring that will fix a minimum quota of immigrants that may be admitted in any one year from any nation. He suggests that 1,200 may well be fixed as a reasonable number. As the law reads at present only 3 per cent of the total of any nationality in this country in the census of 1910 may be admitted annually. Formerly Australia, New

Zealand, and certain other countries sent 1,000 or more desirable immigrants to the United States each year, but under the new law they would be permitted to land only about 200. With a minimum fixed at 1,200 more immigrants from those countries would be admitted, but the immigration from Europe would not be affected, as practically all European countries send far more than that number annually.

A Hole in the Constitution.
Senator Reed Smoot of Utah has proposed an amendment to the Constitution that would permit the Federal Government to tax securities issued by states and municipalities. At present bonds of that nature are tax-free, and Mr. Smoot estimates that \$700,000,000 is lost annually to the government because of its inability to levy against them. "The enactment of some such provision is absolutely necessary," declares Senator Smoot, "if the government is to collect any material amount of taxes in the future from persons of large incomes. My information is that the taxes from this source have fallen

from \$917,000,000 a year down to an estimated amount of less than \$290,000,000 for the year 1930. The amendment of the Constitution in the way I have suggested seems to me a matter of necessary self-protection by the federal government."

It is understood at the Treasury Department that negotiations for the funding of the foreign debts to this country are likely to be postponed until after the conclusion of the conference on the limitations of armaments. It is felt that the results of the meeting will bring about improved financial conditions in the debtor countries, due to the lifting in some measure of the burden of maintaining big armies and navies, that will have a marked influence on the funding agreements that are eventually entered into. Financial delegates are expected in Washington at the same time representatives arrive to attend the armaments conference, but it will not mean that negotiations on the foreign debt are to be conducted along with the discussions on armaments.

PORTLAND, Aug. 17.—Special trains bearing Elks from all over Oregon to the Marshfield state convention of the B. P. O. E. start today. Originating at McMinnville one special train will move down the valley picking up cars at Corvallis, Albany and adding a car from Roseburg and another from Medford at Eugene. The train will reach Marshfield tomorrow morning night, picking up the Salem Elks on the way.

Eastern Oregon delegates will be scattered through the different trains and many have driven cars from this side of the mountains to the city on Coos Bay.
