

BOYS COMPETE FOR HONORS

Congressman Nick Sinaott will make his 1922 appointments to the Naval Academy at Annapolis and the Military Academy at West Point by means of a competitive examination. This examination will be held for Mr. Sinaott by the U. S. Civil Service Commission on October 23, 1921 in Baker, La Grande, Klamath Falls, Ontario, Pendleton and The Dalles.

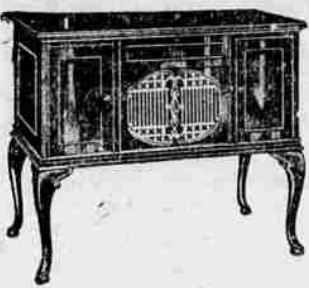
Appointments will be made by the congressman according to the grades made by the candidates taking the examination, as reported to him by the examiners of the Civil Service Commission.

The Second District of Oregon will have three vacancies at the Naval Academy, three principalships and nine alternateships; and one principalship and two alternateships at the Military Academy during 1922. The official examinations to Annapolis are held during February and April, 1922, and for West Point March 7, 1922. Mr. Sinaott has set the date for the competitive examination far ahead in order that those successful therein may have plenty of time to prepare for the official examinations.

Any young man of the requisite age who is a bona fide residence of the Second District of Oregon is eligible to take the examination. Full particulars regarding same may be had by writing to Hon. N. J. Sinaott, Room 347 House of Representatives, Washington, D. C.

IVANHOE, THE BOOSTER.
"We have a wonderful crop in our valley this year," reports F. S. Ivanhoe, attorney of La Grande, who was in Portland at the Imperial yesterday. "The strikes of the damage done to grain by recent storms have been much exaggerated. He has had some rain, but no serious storms. La Grande is a live town in what I think is the prettiest valley in the world. If the valley were cultivated to capacity, it would sustain 1,200,000 persons. Our fruit is coming along nicely. We don't ever have to worry about not having anything to eat and everything we raise is first-class, too. La Grande has the advantage of a large railroad payroll of about \$500,000 each month and two large sawmills to provide employment. Some building material and labor are so high that many hesitate to build. There are no desirable vacant houses to rent and those who want new homes need to either buy or build." Mr. Ivanhoe will leave today with the Portland delegation for the Elks' convention in Marshfield. He has been a member of the Elks since 1898 and has been active in the state association work. The lodge with headquarters at La Grande has a membership of 1,290 which includes also the members in Wallowa county. Mr. Ivanhoe has lived for 34 years in Union and Wallowa counties. He was district attorney for nine years.—Oregonian.

Escapes from Chain Gang
The police and sheriff here have been notified by Sheriff Fred D. Rhinehart of Wallowa county that Elmer Cornelison, serving a sentence in that county, escaped last evening from a road gang on which he was being worked and it was thought that he was headed towards La Grande. Cornelison was recently convicted on a larceny charge in Wallowa county and is also wanted here, Sheriff Lee Wannick having a warrant for him. No trace of Cornelison has been found so far.

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Uneven Is the Hem

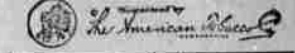
