MANY ROAD BIDS ASKED

Million Dollars Worth of Work to be Let by State Highway Commission Soon.

SALEM, Aug. 18.—Bids for the improvement of approximately 55 miles of highway and construction of several bridges, at an aggregate cost of more than \$1,000,000 will be considered at a special meeting of the state highway commission in Portland, August 30.

Thirteen counties in the state will be affected by the proposed road improvements, while bridges will be constructed in six counties.

It was announced at the highway commission offices today that an effort will be made to get many of the contracts under way this fall.

Projects are announced.

The several projects for which bids will be received follow:

Clackamas county—Mount Hood loop highway, Multnomah county line to Salmon river, divided into three units: Multnomah county line Sandy, 6.5 miles, macadam; Sandy Cherryville, 6.7 miles, macadam; Cherryville-Frightwood, 5.9 miles.

Clatsop county—Coast highway Young's bay bridge and north and south, paving.

Crook county—Crooked river highway, Prineville-Hear Creek, macadam, 7700 cubic yards surfacing.

Dechutes county—Central Oregon highway, Hood-Horse Ridge section graveling, 10.9 miles.

Douglas Work to be Done.

Douglas county—Roosevelt-Cross Bay highway, Winston-Camas Hill section, 14.5 miles, grading.

Grant county—John Day river highway, Wheeler county line east, 11.4 miles, macadam.

Hood River county—Mount Hood loop highway, Hood hill section, five miles, grading.

Jackson and Klamath counties—Ashland-Klamath Falls highway, Jewell creek-Hyden creek section, two units, 14.2 miles, grading.

Jackson county—Pacific highway Ashland-Talent section, widening present roadbed.

Roadbed to be Widened.

Pacific highway, Central Point-Gold Hill section, widening present roadbed.

Josephine county—Pacific highway, Wolf creek-Graves creek section, widening roadbed.

Malheur county—Central Oregon highway, Vale-Burrell section, 6.5 miles, grading and graveling.

John Day river highway, Jamieson-Brogan section, 6.2 miles, grading.

Umatilla county—Guard fence on state highways, approximately 49,000 linear feet.

Yamhill county—West Side highway, McMinnville-Amity section, 2.4 miles graveling; West Side highway Yamhill section, 8000 square yards of pavement.

Culverts to be Built.

Baker county—four culverts and two short trestle spans on the Huntington-Nelson section.

Lane county—Superstructure only for a bridge over the Williamson river between College Grove and Latham. Alternate bids are asked for wood and steel spans.

Malheur county—A 30-foot steel truss span with wood approaches over Belly creek near Vale.

Morrow county—Three bridges on the town of Heppner; a 30-foot concrete span in the town of Lexington.

Umatilla county—A bridge over stage gulch at Stanfield.

Washington county—A concrete bridge of three spans totaling 100 feet in length over Scroggins creek near Forest Grove.
