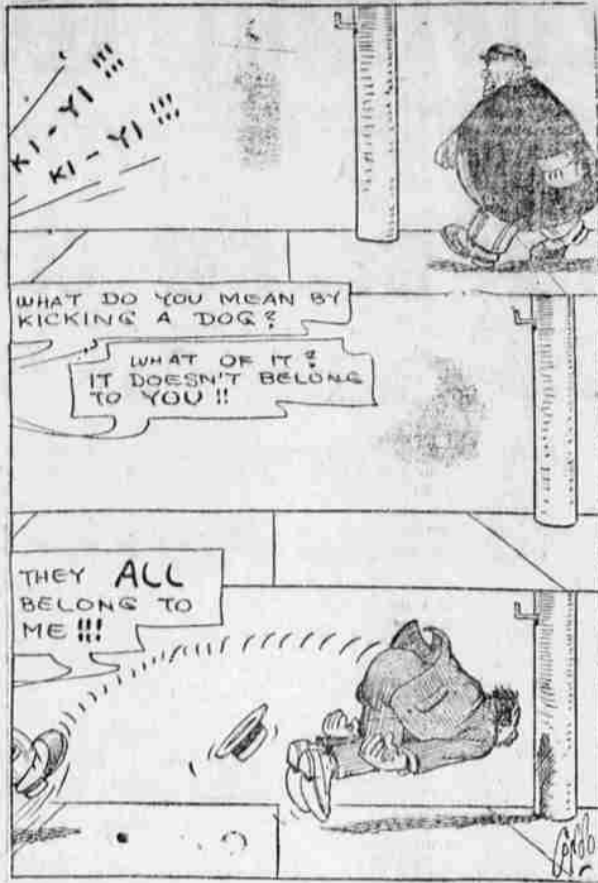

BUY CARLOAD OF SEED WHEAT

Kiddle Brothers Exchange Hybrid 128 for Other Seed Wheat at Imbler

In order that farmers in the Imbler section will have every possible opportunity to buy Hybrid 128 wheat seed of good quality and do so at reasonable terms, Kiddle Brothers have purchased a carload of the seed and are offering it to farmers in exchange for seed wheat of other varieties, the farmers having to pay for the cleaning of the wheat they exchange for the Hybrid 128. The county farm bureau is working in cooperation with Kiddle Brothers in introducing the hybrid wheat here.

The Hybrid 128 wheat is said to be a better milling wheat than Fortyfold and experiments have shown it to be a variety that yields much more than Fortyfold. Harry G. Avery, county agent, states that the yield will average at least seven bushels per acre greater than the yield of Fortyfold, which is one of the most popular varieties in the valley. In order that every farmer growing Fortyfold may find out just how the yield compares on his own land, Mr. Avery recommends that two adjacent fields be similarly prepared and that the two varieties be planted and given the same attention.

Where this has been done, Mr. Avery's conclusions have been verified, excepting that it appears that the yield is more than seven bushels per acre. On the Taylor place near Alicel where experiments on the two varieties were tried this year according to the plan laid down by Mr. Avery, the Fortyfold field produced 20 bushels per acre and the Hybrid 128 produced 40 bushels per acre. While not all of the experimental fields have been threshed, Mr. Avery is convinced that the farmers will secure at least seven bushels per acre more in all cases where this new variety is substituted for the Fortyfold.

Every indication is that the farmers of the valley are expecting to put in an enormous acreage of this new wheat. In the vicinity of Elgin, where there is only one field of Hybrid 128 this year, farmers who have already indicated that they will plant at least a part of their acreage in Hybrid 128 will need at least a carload of seed.

Mr. Avery points out that the tendency to smut must be watched in this wheat, but that this should not discourage the farmers as added yield with proper attention will far outweigh this tendency to smut.

BERT LYTELL AGAIN SCORES BIG SUCCESS

There have been plays with "cave men" heroes before, and undoubtedly there will be many to follow, but all who saw Bert Lytell yesterday in the Metro special, "The Mieland Lady" which is the feature attraction of a well-balanced bill at the Sherry Theatre, say that none can attain the marvelous quality which characterizes this one.

This was to be expected, for Bert Lytell lifts every play in which he stars out of the ordinary into the peaks of achievement. He gave the role of the woman-hating lover a verve and force that made for a thrilling evening to the packed house which sat absorbed through the exciting abduction and woman taming scenes, or which shook with laughter at the delicious humor which saturates the picture.

This is an unusual picture, more effective even in the screen version than in the original play form by Charles Goddard and Paul Dickney, when it scored such a triumph on the New York stage. The reason is obvious—the brilliant work of Bert Lytell gives the adaptation for the silver screen an unforgettable masterful touch.

He is admirable as Jack Craigen, the engineer who has returned to effect New York from a big construction job in Africa, only to find that his supposedly invulnerable woman-hating spirit has been broken through meeting a lovely society girl, Helen Steele. He progresses without loss of time, but discovers that he has been made a fool of. Helen has made him get down on his knees to prove that she has stage ability and deserves the place of leading woman at the "little theatre" run as a hobby by a millionaire.

Craigen loses no time in smothering her off, struggling, to his hunting lodge in the fastnesses of the Adirondacks. There he proceeds to give Helen a lesson in primitive emotion and soon succeeds, through his brute wooing, in winning her love. But only after she has knocked him unconscious, and her fiancé has come up to set matters with Craigen and finds himself unable to do so.

The picture leaves nothing to be desired. The production was directed with excellent art by George Irving under the personal supervision of Maxwell Karger. Lois Zellner adapted the play.

Chapter 12 of "Lightning Boy" is a whirlwind of action.

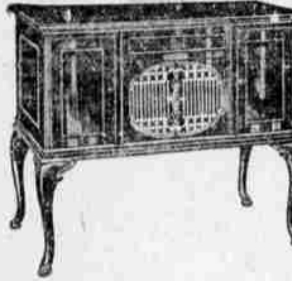

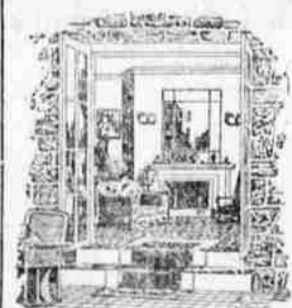
