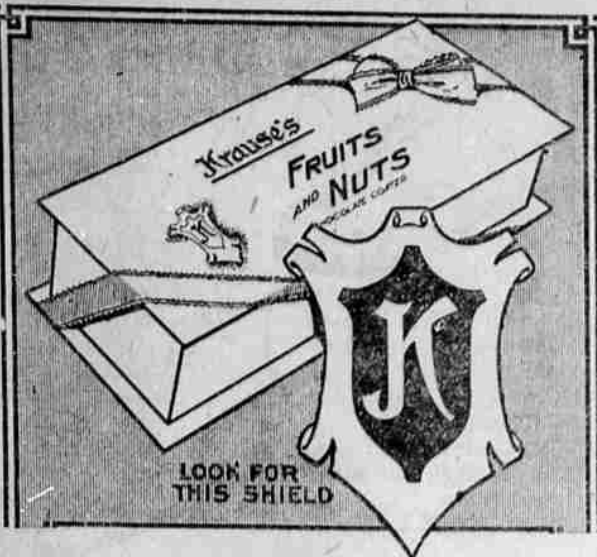

Peare Long In Party Work.

With the appointment of J. H. Peare to the land office comes recollections of work performed by the man who has been rated for the past

twenty-five years as the most effective single-handed political worker in Oregon. It is common knowledge that Peare would leave anything else to help the Republican party win its battles. Of late years he has become a state character and politically he has been consulted and advised with by party leaders from all portions of Oregon.

Almost as long as he has lived in Eastern Oregon he has served on the Republican Central committee and members of the party have grown to look to Mr. Peare's leadership in county and district matters that effect the party.
