MR. JACKSON IS APPOINTED

Publisher of Journal Will Help Create Woodrow Wilson Foundation Fund

NEW YORK, Aug. 18.—Appointment of Hon. Samuel Jackson of Portland, publisher of the Oregon Journal, to serve as chairman in Oregon for Woodrow Wilson Foundation was announced today by Franklin D. Roosevelt. Mr. Roosevelt is national chairman of the committee in charge of raising a popular fund for endowing an annual award in ex-President Wilson's name. This appointment was said to have been among the first for the forty-eight state organizations which are to present an appeal to the public late in October.

Mr. Roosevelt also announced that the specific purpose of the Foundation and the award, had been defined by the executive committee in the following terms:
"Created by public subscription in recognition of the national and international services of Woodrow Wilson, twice president of the United States, who furthered the cause of human freedom and was instrumental in pointing out effective methods for the cooperation of the liberal forces of mankind throughout the world.

"The Award or Awards from the income of the Foundation will be made from time to time by a nationally constituted committee to the individual or group that has rendered within a specified period, meritorious services to democracy, public welfare, liberal thought or peace through justice."
Hamilton Holt, editor of the In-

dependent, who is acting as executive director of the Foundation, is carrying on the work of organization along non-partisan lines, aiming merely to provide an opportunity for a public tribute to the cause of liberalism. National headquarters have been established at 150 Nassau St., New York.

OFFICERS HAVE MURDER CLUE

PENDLETON, Aug. 18.—Beyond saying that they had a definite clue upon which they were working, county officials are loath to discuss the case of Matt Jepsen, aged recluse who was murdered some time ago at his home on Government mountain and his body hid in a well for three weeks before it was discovered. Sheriff Houser has unearthed a clue during the past few days that he believes will lead to the apprehension of the murderer and he, assisted by deputy sheriffs and Deputy District Attorney Randall have spent some time on the trail of the suspect. Developments are expected within a short time.

Deputy Coroner Brady, in response to a wire to officials at Jamarstown, Kansas, has received a wire from Mrs. Anderson Peterson of that city, who says she is a sister of the murdered man and the only relative living. She asked for full particulars by wire, which were forwarded to her by the coroner's office.
