DENIES CHARGES WHEN ARRESTED

Girl Said to Have Jumped
a Ten Thousand Dollar
Bond on Trial of Murder
in Tennessee.

TACOMA, Aug. 22.—Mrs. William H. Stubbs, wife of a local hotel proprietor, was detained by the police today suspected of being Maude Moore who is wanted at Knoxville, Tenn. for the murder of Leroy D. Harb, an automobile dealer, in September 1919.

The girl is said to have jumped a ten thousand dollar appeal bond after having received a sentence of twenty years.

Mrs. Stubbs stoutly denies that she is Maude Moore and declares she will be released when two men en route from Knoxville arrive to identify her.

Brumfield Agitated by Reporters; Jury Being Drawn to Sit on Case

Trial Starts Monday and
Great Interest Is
Shown

CRIME LABELED AS VERY COARSE

District Attorney Reviews
Different Features Show-
ing Bad Work.

ROSEBURG, Aug. 22.—Sheriff Starmer today drew thirty-one names from which an attempt will be made to get a jury to try Dr. Brumfield, charged with the spectacular murder of Dennis Russell near this city some time ago.

The trial starts next Monday and great interest is centered in it all over Southern Oregon.

Brumfield became much agitated when interviewed in his cell today, declaring he would not answer questions regarding the Russell killing. He protested to the sheriff when a reporter asked him regarding the purchase of women's lingerie on the day of the murder.

Attorney Reviews Crime.
PORTLAND, Aug. 22.—That the murder of Dennis Russell, Roseburg, was far from being the "perfect crime" it was been pictured was the assertion Thursday afternoon of George Neuner, Jr., district attorney of Douglas county, who sketched briefly the facts which made the murder, in his opinion, one of the crudest rather than the cleverest, in recent criminal history.

Evidently intending to disguise the body so that it would be mistaken for that of Dr. R. M. Brumfield, who is now charged with the brutal killing, Neuner said the slayer did nothing more than slip the doctor's ring on the third finger of the victim's left hand.

Contrary to published report, Neuner said, that was the sole indication of the intention to disguise the body. The shoes on the victim's feet were those purchased by Dennis Russell and could not have been worn by Brumfield. The clothes were those of Russell. Russell's notebook, with the recuse's peculiar scrawl on its pages, was in an inside vest pocket. Russell's own watch was in a pocket. How anyone could have been thrown off the scent for more than a moment

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Pendleton Sidewalks To be Kept Clean

PENDLETON, Aug. 22.—Pendleton sidewalks and streets must be cleared of all obstructions such as merchandise, boxes, barrels, bicycle racks, fuel and anything else that obstructs traffic, according to an order issued by C. A. Crabtree, commissioner of streets. This action is taken under a city ordinance providing that all streets and sidewalks must be unobstructed for traffic and that all goods in transit can occupy the outer three feet of a sidewalk and no longer than half an hour.

Cordwood may remain closely corded for a period not to exceed 48 hours in the street adjacent to where it is to be used.

WALLOWA MINES PRODUCE SILVER

BAKER, Aug. 22.—Samples of high grade silver ore from what is claimed to be a seven foot ledge and carrying values of \$24 to the ton, have been received at the office of the Oregon and Idaho Investment company in this city from the owners of the property which is situated in the Innahua country, Wallowa county.

The ore carries besides high grade silver values a large percentage of gold and copper.

UNVEIL THE MONUMENT IN OLD FRANCE

Exercises Held at Flierey
Attended by Many Not-
able Men.

PLACE LONG HELD BY AMERICAN BOYS

Major Emery Delivers a
Sharp Address When
Speaking of the Enemy
of 1918.

FLIEREY, France, Aug. 22.—Lorraine's monument to the American expeditionary forces, the dedication of which was one of the principal objects of the present visit of the American Legion delegation to France, was unveiled here Sunday by the Legion representatives in the presence of the whole countryside. Marshal Foch, Louis Barthou, minister of the liberated regions, and Ambassador Herriek participated in the ceremonies. The people of Flierey, who all speak more or less English as a result of their long association with the Americans, who held the sector, were deeply affected by the memories the unveiling brought up, laughing and crying by turns as they exchanged greetings with the American friends and intently followed the progress of the exercises.

The Legionnaires came in automobiles from Metz, stopping on the way while Maj. John G. Emery, national Commander of the American Legion, who served in the First division in the war, placed a wreath on the grave of Lieut. Jefferson Feigel, the first officer of the First division killed in France. Major Emery himself received from M. Barthou the insignia of commander of the Legion of Honor and from Marshal Foch the war cross with palm, in recognition of his having been wounded during the fighting in the Argonne and being cited in American army orders. President Harding, General Pershing, Ambassador Herriek, Major Emery, Marshal Foch and M. Barthou were created honorary citizens of Flierey.

The monument unveiled Sunday, which is a blunt, obelisk-shaped shaft, bearing bas reliefs of two "dough-boys" with appropriate inscriptions, stands beside the road, facing the village, between the village and the old fighting front. From the monument the trenches and entanglements of the former battle lines are still visible. Flierey itself, where every house was destroyed in the war, is now fully rebuilt.

Emery Warns Enemy.
In his address at the unveiling, Major Emery expressed the hope that the enemy of 1918 would always remember three things:

Three Persons Perish in Georgia Hotel Fire

MACON, Ga., Aug. 22.—Three persons are known to have lost their lives in a fire which destroyed the Brown House, a frame hotel here early today, and firemen expressed the belief that the death list would be materially increased when the ruins were searched. Twenty guests were injured and many jumped to avoid the flames. Men on the sidewalk below saved many women who jumped into their arms.

Panama Ordered to Give Up Territory

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—The United States has informed the government of Panama that as friendly mediator between Panama and Costa Rica in their boundary dispute, it does not feel compelled to suggest that Costa Rica delay longer in taking jurisdiction over territory now held by Panama, and which was adjudged to belong to Costa Rica by the terms of the White award.

The position of this government was stated in a note transmitted by Secretary Hughes to the government of Panama on August 18, and made public Sunday by the state department.

Costa Rica has advised the United States, the note said, of its determination to assume immediately jurisdiction over the territory.

Almost simultaneously with publication of the note, it became known that a force of marines had been embarked at Philadelphia for the canal zone.

WEEKS CUTS OUT MONEY UNNECESSARY

War Secretary Claims 27
Million Can Be
Trimmed

APPROPRIATIONS CAN BE REDUCED

Spirit of Economy Seems to
Be Spreading Over Wash-
ington With Excellent
Effect.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—The present administration of the war department has effected every possible economy, Secretary Weeks stated in a summary of the work since March 4, transmitted to Chairman Kahn of the house military committee. The report made public Sunday by Mr. Kahn said the department had economized "even to the extent of restricting activities which would ordinarily be considered necessary, where this could be done without injury to the service."

Reviewing the accomplishments of the department since he became secretary, Mr. Weeks declared that in his opinion one of the greatest was the selection of General Pershing and General Harbord as chief and deputy chief of staff, as it meant the lessons of the war would not be lost.

Reduction of the army from 242,000 to 150,000 enlisted men, Mr. Weeks said, would cost approximately \$6,000,000 due to statutory requirements regarding the payment of bonuses, travel expenses, etc., to discharged soldiers. In an effort to avoid a deficit during the current fiscal year a survey of all appropriations available had been made in co-operation with director of the budget, with the result that \$27,000,000 already had been set aside as not needed.

A survey of all government real estate under control of the department showed 97 parcels as surplus, which would be disposed of, he reported. The cost value of property declared surplus by the department since March 4 was given as \$108,089,187, while the cost value of the amounts sold was \$121,615,851. The amount received from sales was \$23,294,690.

AGED JOSEPH MAN PASSES

JOSEPH, Aug. 22.—Leonard Henry Metzger passed away at his home here last Wednesday. He had been ailing for sometime and suffered from a general breakdown. He was born in Germany in 1852 and came to this country at the age of three. Five of his eight children survive.

400 Marines Sail For the Costa Rica Trouble

WASHINGTON, Aug. 22.—While 400 marines sailed southward today on the battleship Pennsylvania to stand-by when Costa Rica marches her forces into the bit of territory whose ownership Panama has contested, officials said they do not expect trouble.

Child Labor Law is Held Unconstitutional

QUEENSBORO, N. C., Aug. 22.—Federal Judge Boyd held the new Federal child labor law unconstitutional today. Judge Boyd, two years ago, also held unconstitutional the Owen-Kesting child labor law and the Supreme court of the United States upheld that ruling.
