UNION LAD IN BIG WRECK

Ship Was Trying to Beat
Other Boat at Time of
Wreck, He Says

UNION, Aug. 22—A letter has been received here from C. E. Davis, father of Richard Davis, who left Union August 4 and was in the Alaska wreck. The father's letter tells the story of the sinking of the ship that carried down so many lives. In part Mr. Davis wrote as follows:

"When the ship struck, he was in his stateroom, but went on deck immediately, where they put on life preservers and waited for orders what to do. He said the officers said they were around on the beach, that there was no danger and that no boats would be lowered.

"In a few minutes they were ordered to the next deck below, and hardly got there when the ship began to list, and in a few minutes more began to sink and people began to jump overboard. Richard climbed over the rail and hung on, and in about five minutes the boat went under, and he said he had hard work to hold his breath until he could get to the surface.

"The water was full of people and two men grabbed him around the neck and pulled him under. When he came up, he struck and kicked off and got clear of them. He swam around in the dark and found a piece of board and hung on to that. After a while he saw an empty boat. He swam to it and climbed in with much difficulty, and in a short time two more boys drifted by and got in. Then they got two oars unlash with much difficulty, and commenced picking up people. They soon had their boat full.

"It was so dark and foggy that they could see but a short distance. Once in a while they could see some dim lights and pulled for the one they could see the oftenest. Then they came across a man and his wife clinging to a piece of wreckage. Mrs. Royal Allen, Mrs. Ray Duncan, Mrs. Chris Berzich, Mrs. Paul M. Ellis, Mrs. Lou Payne and Mrs. Roy Lay. "After about three hours rowing, the fog lifted for a few minutes and they saw a ship close to them. All that were able gave a yell, which was answered from the ship, and Richard said it sounded pretty good.

"Richard said he kept warm after he got in the boat, as but himself and one other had any knowledge of rowing. They picked up enough so that there were twenty-three in their boat and it was only supposed to carry nineteen. Out of the lot, those were only six or seven that were able to do anything. It took two to row, as all the oars were lost but two, and two to half water, one to steer and one to watch for survivors. The man that bailed worked hard, as the boat was so loaded that it took water from nearly every wave.

"One fellow came through the whole frozen with his derby hat on, and it was not even dented but merely covered with crude oil. That man Dyer, from La Grande, was close to Richard, and was badly injured, having lost the use of his legs. Richard says a boat load of the crew left the ship before it went down.

"Many were killed when the boilers exploded, but Richard was under water when that happened as the explosion occurred just after the ship sank and he was taken down with the men. The water was covered with wreckage for miles around.

"The Alaska was inside the light-ship, so was off its course, but they were trying to beat the other boat's time, and were hugging close to the shore.

"Richard looks rather 'wall-eyed,' and is sound asleep now, but I think with plenty of sleep and rest he will
