One and all are urged to participate in the evening fun and amusement. Three dances, a band concert on streets, prize fighting and a general good time.

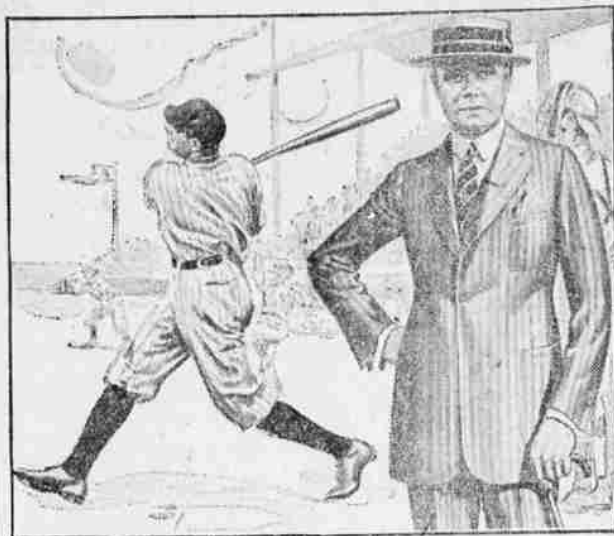
