CARNIVAL LAW IS ADEQUATE

City Commission Decides That no New Ordinance Regulating Street Shows Is Needed.

At the meeting of the city commissioners last evening a petition was presented asking that a law be passed prohibiting tent shows and street carnivals from showing in La Grande. The petitioners pointed out the ill effects of such shows, calling attention to the erroneous ideas carnivals are likely to put into the minds of young people and the large sums of money taken out of the town by such shows. It was also pointed out that the work of the churches and schools is counteracted in some measure by carnivals and tent shows.

The commission requested would exempt "bona-fide" circuses and home talent organizations. After discussing the petition the commission decided that the present law is adequate and that the only fault to be found was that in the past carnivals have always been brought to La Grande by lodges and that the lodges have asked concessions regarding license, the granting of which made it possible to bring the carnivals here, the license fee being too great if the full amount required by law were exacted.

Law Is Stricter.
The commissioners also called attention to the fact that because these carnivals have been brought here by lodges to raise money "for a good cause" the law has been somewhat frowned upon and gambling games permitted and the commission was agreed that if the police are instructed in the future not to allow any violation of ordinances carnivals will give this city a wide berth.

"If the ordinances are enforced and we make the carnivals live up to the law, street carnivals will stay away from La Grande," was the statement of one commissioner. "Every time a carnival has been here it has come under the auspices of some organization that has come before us and made a plea for concessions on the prohibitive license that the law provides for, but that these organizations feel it should be dispensed with in order to allow them to bring carnivals here."

Over Hundred Couples Attend First Dance Under Auspices of Local Organization.

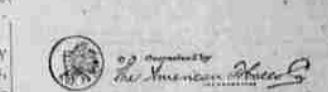
