OPTIMISM SEEMS TO BE KEYNOTE

Large New York Firm
Makes Survey and Pro-
nounces Things Safe

With a desire to learn what conditions are direct from retailers the firm of M. F. Gould of New York recently wrote O. E. Silverthorne of La Grande to know the exact business conditions in this vicinity. Mr. Silverthorne replied and then the Gould concern sent him a letter giving a reflection of the general information it had received.

The letter in part follows: "We want to thank you very much for the reply to our inquiry as to the business conditions in Oregon. Your letter was very enlightening indeed. It is so much better to get direct from a man who is in contact with the situation than to get it from newspaper reports.

"We share with you the belief that the coming season will show a decided improvement. There is a great amount of employment throughout the country, extending into alarming figures, but nevertheless we refuse to be alarmed by it. Apparently there was money saved up to weather thru these times. There has been little want or suffering anywhere reported. There is a great drifting population about our streets and from city to city but there is nothing like the alarming situation that such unemployment has precipitated in years gone by.

"There seems to be plenty of money also in the land, the buying goes on in some lines, just as formerly. Only yesterday, a traveling man seated at luncheon, told me that he had had a recent report that not until about two months ago had the Steinway Piano Company felt the stress of the buying strike at all. In other words, there was money enough to buy Steinway Pianos in an unprecedented quantity by the public. The high priced automobiles have been selling rapidly, the moderate priced ones also have done well, and Ford is reported to be in the way of turning out over a million for the current year. So there is money and it is being spent. It is bound to work into the channel of ordinary retail trade.

"The crop situation is somewhat discouraging on account of the rapid decline in prices. At the cost it was to your farmers to plant wheat a year ago, 52 cents per bushel, even with a 40-bushel yield is not enough. This situation, however, it seems to us, comes about because of the inability of foreign countries to buy our wheat. They have not established sufficient credit in this country, they cannot, they are practically bankrupt. We cannot see therefore how these general commodities can be so greatly increased in price for rapid buying. However, we believe that things will improve greatly in a general way and that we all will share in it."
