BANQUET TO BE GIVEN AT UNION

Dairymen and Bankers Will Discuss Future Business Conditions at the Union Hotel.

Approximately fifteen La Grande dairymen, bankers and prospective dairymen have been provided for at the banquet at Union September 2, when the first real kickoff for small dairy herds in this county will be staged at the Union hotel. The Union Commercial club and the Ad club here were in long distance conference in the matter this morning and while more can probably be accommodated, the preliminary number of plates reserved today was 15. Space is at a premium and reservations must be made. This can be done by people from the La Grande side of the valley by getting in touch with A. W. Nelson at Ad club headquarters in the Y. M. C. A., or with County Agent Avery. Parties wishing to go can get automobile transportation by conferring with Mr. Nelson as soon as possible, and also get plate reservation the same way.

The dinner begins at 6:30, September 2nd, but reservations must be in September 1st. Dairy experts from O. A. C. will explain the proper means and ways of nurturing the small dairy, and the whole meeting is to develop into a round table, looking toward increase in dairy herds of this county. Union county farmers already in the business will speak.

The dairy movement had its original boom at Union about three weeks ago when it developed unexpectedly during a gathering of people to entertain the O. A. C. Board of Regents. It took instant root and now has developed into a well-organized county-wide movement intended to convince the owner of small farm tracts that the dairy cow is an abiding source of cash—the salvation of his kind.

At the recent Union meeting the whole situation was summed up by a Union merchant who deals with all manner of farm folks and he declared that the man with a small dairy pays his grocery bill every month, for the simple reason he has a cash income every week.

OPPOSE LOW GRAIN RATES.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 26.—Reductions in freight rates on grain and hay asked by the western states would result in an annual loss to the western railroads of \$63,700,000 and would reduce their return on capital invested to 1.67 per cent, E. Werthing, manager of the bureau of statistics for western carriers, testified before the interstate commerce commission.

Earnings of western carriers in freight traffic for the current year will amount to only \$143,387,000, the witness estimated.

He testified that even in the face of wage cuts made by the railroad labor board and effective July 1, the reduction asked would be disastrous to the carriers.

**ROAD BONDS
BEING SIGNED**

Issue of \$400,000 Will Be Taken by Portland Firm at 95.85 of Par

Within ten days it is expected that the \$400,000 issue of road bonds of Union county will be marketed. County Judge U. G. Couch being busy signing the bonds today. The bid of Ralph Schmedel and Company of Portland submitted last week was the high bid, the price at which the bonds are to be taken over being 95.85 of par.

Some delay in consummating the deal is being caused by the absence of the county clerk on his vacation but as he is expected to return the first of next month, within ten days the deal will probably have been completed.

The bonds are of \$1,000 denomination and bear 5 per cent interest.
