Dentists Talk of Lowering Prices

MILWAUKEE, Wis., Aug. 27.—The problem of giving good dentistry to workmen at lower prices is one of the great questions confronting the profession, Dr. Henry L. Banzhaf of Milwaukee told the national Dental Association which was in session here Aug. 16. He advocated cooperative clinics as a solution.

"The average American workman man should be able to buy honest dentistry at a reasonable fee," Dr. Banzhaf said.

"Better dentistry at lower fees can only be accomplished when a group of dentists, each a specialist in his field, comes together in a central located cooperative dental clinic. Each dentist must operate in his chosen field only, thus increasing his efficiency 40 per cent, because he does only the work in which he is best qualified to do."

Dr. Banzhaf said the Milwaukee industrial dental clinic was proving a success. This does work for industrial establishments with which it has agreements.

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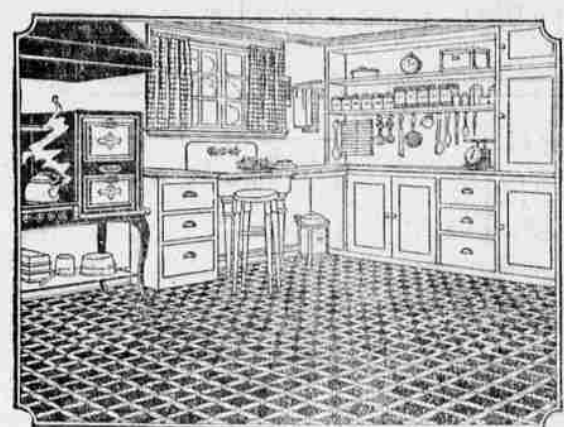
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
