which it passes appears to be plowing through fire, so luminous is this animal. When this animal is placed in a formalin solution, which is used for "pickling" the laboratory specimens, it loses its luminosity and its small size makes it appear as though the solution is cloudy.

A large tube worm with sea anemones growing on it is another very unique part of the collection. Smaller tube worms are found on shells where they build a casing as they grow, in which to live. Another interesting specimen of sea anemone and one that is very rare in the Puget Sound region is one that has a plant growing in it on which it depends for food.

In one of the many bottles containing specimens is a mussel with a sponge growing on it. Others contain various oddities. A sea urchin with bristles looking like a porcupine, a sea pen and a sea mouse are among the interesting curiosities. The sea mouse doesn't look a great deal like a mouse when it is uncurled, being in reality a worm, but when it is curled up with its furry back it looks just like a mouse curled and asleep.

The hydroid is a animal with a nervous system, but unless one has this explained by someone who can speak with authority the first meeting up with this odd animal would make one think it was a vegetable growth. It is white in color and appears to be in every respect a miniature collection of tree branches with all the little twigs and signs of buds.

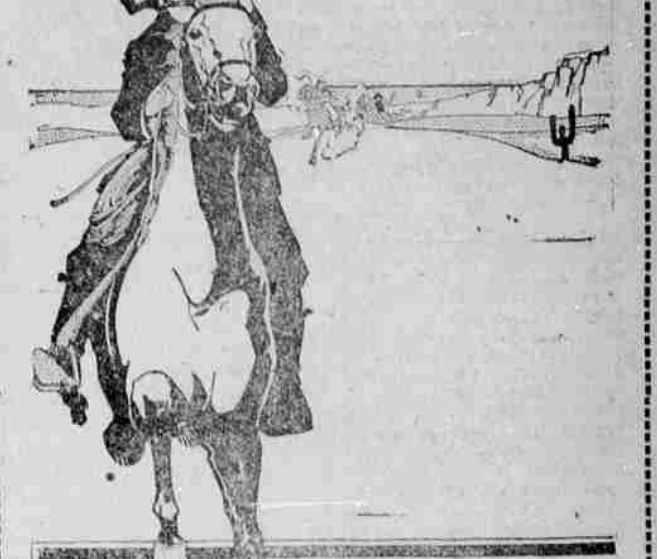
