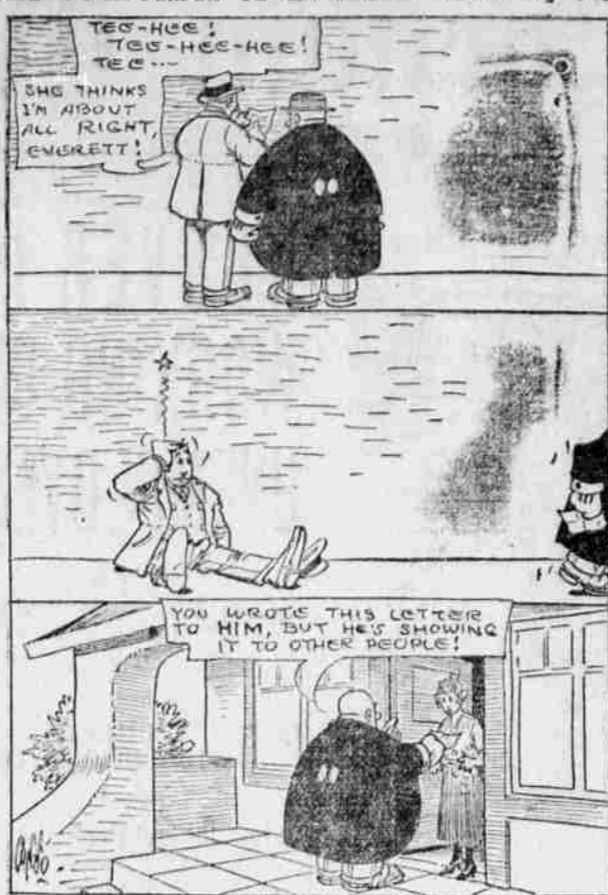

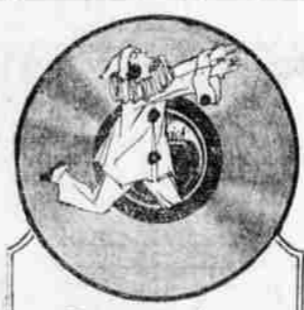
ELGIN AFTER BLOOD.

EXONERATED FROM BLAME

Coroner's Jury Finds in Favor of Jesse Brunn, Charged with Murder Last Sunday

PENDLETON, Aug. 29.—Jesse Brunn, or Jesse Roberts, as he is better known, was exonerated from all blame for shooting Louis Ragains early last Sunday morning at Wright's cabin in the mountains near S-ackey Prairie by the coroner's jury in the verdict brought in this morning at the conclusion of the testimony in the inquest. The verdict finds that "Louis Ragains came to his death as the result of a gunshot wound, the said shot being fired by Jesse Roberts, or Brunn, and we further find that the said shot was so fired by the said Jesse Roberts, or Brunn, in self-defense." The verdict was signed by A. H. Cox, E. F. Averill, J. P. Murphy, C. F. Bloom, William Hanson and S. F. Bowman.

After hearing the testimony of James Roach and Joseph Cunha, Jr., who were the only witnesses examined this morning, it required only a few minutes for the jury to draw up the verdict. Roach was with Ragains during the day Saturday and Cunha talked with Ragains when the latter and Roach came down to the Cunha cabin Saturday evening, and the testimony offered by the two men corroborated the stories told by Charles Runyon and George M. Shields at the earlier session of the inquest held last Monday morning.

"Half Drunk, or Half Crazy."

Ragains and Roach rode away from the Wright cabin Saturday evening about 6:30 and arrived at the Cunha cabin between 8:30 and 9 o'clock, the testimony of Roach showed, and his story was verified by Cunha as to the time of his arrival. Roach said that Ragains and Brunn had an argument before he and Ragains left the Wright cabin. Roach put up his horse at Cunha's, and arrangements were made for him to stay all night with the Cunha boys. Ragains, however, said he was going back "to the top," meaning up the mountain to the Wright cabin. Cunha told of his efforts to dissuade Ragains from his plan of returning to the Wright cabin. Asked whether he thought Ragains was drunk, Cunha declared on the stand that it was his opinion that Ragains was "either half drunk or half crazy."

PICRIC ACID AIDS CLEARING LAND

Logged-off Areas Respond to the Use of the New Method Recently Adopted

PORTLAND, Aug. 29.—(Special)—A great impetus will be given the clearing of logged-off and burned-off lands of the state through the use of a large amount of picric acid which the government has made available for the land-owner, according to a statement issued by Charles Hall of Klamath Falls, president of the Oregon State Chamber of Commerce, following the recent notification from Washington that Oregon has been allotted 192,000 pounds of this explosive.

According to government bulletins picric acid is of greater strength than dynamite and is safer to handle. It is an explosive which was used in the great war, and with a great surplus on hand at the conclusion of the war, the government decided to turn it over to the different states on a basis of the amount of logged-off lands in each state.

Land-owners of the state must place their orders for the picric acid with the Oregon Agricultural College, according to advice from Washington. When the number of orders equals a carload, the Agricultural College will forward this order to the U. S. Department of Agriculture and the explosive will be shipped to the state from the nearest cartridge plant. Individual orders will be limited to 1,000 pounds, and the total cost of the explosive, including the cost of carting, handling, distributing and freight, will be in the neighborhood of 13 cents per pound.

"The State Chamber has been following developments closely in regard to the distribution of picric acid," said Mr. Hall. "We believe that the cheapness and efficiency of this explosive will give a great impetus to land-clearing operations in Oregon. The total cost of the picric acid to the consumer is much lower than commercial explosives at the present market price and a great demand for the government explosive should come from some of our districts where the bulk of the undeveloped lands are logged-off and burned-off."

"Taken in conjunction with the logged-off Land Bill which was passed by the last legislature, I believe that the use of picric acid will mean much to the development of the state."
