FIRST WOMAN JUROR CALLED

Malheur County Woman Is Called for Service; Has Not Said Whether She Will Serve.

ONTARIO, Aug. 30.—Miss Ruby H. Kelley of Jamison is the first woman in Oregon to be called for jury service under the new state law which was approved by the voters at the special election last spring.

Miss Kelley will be called on to help pass judgment in Malheur county litigation.

Whether or not Miss Kelley will exercise her woman's prerogative and decline to serve on account of her sex, is not known. If she does not avail herself of the provisions of the law, visitors at the term of the dis-

trict court which opens at Vale tomorrow will have the privilege of seeing questions of law and justice determined in part at least by a woman. Miss Kelley is a cousin of Mrs. H. V. Melville of this city.

Breeding Foxes in Captivity. Approximately 4,500 silver-black foxes are being bred to captivity in the United States, according to reports to the bureau of biological survey. United States Department of Agriculture, from 215 fox ranches, representing a value in animals and equipment estimated at \$4,270,830. All reports have not yet been received, and conservative estimates place the number of silver-black fox in this country at from 5,000 to 6,000.

"The Restless Sex," bearing the magic stamp of Robert W.
