Ad. Club Receives Letter Asking for Information

Back in the 18th century the esteemed Bishop Berkeley, with prophetic vision, wrote:

"Westward the course of Empire takes its way,
Time's noblest offspring is the last."

Thus begins a most breezy letter to the Ad. Club asking for information about La Grande and Union county, and is worthy of reproduction, for it tells in a few words the whole story "why commercial institutions in the Western States." The letter is from one of the leading advertising concerns in the United States, and goes quite into a breezy way:

"The eyes of the East are on the West. The rapid growth of population during the last decade, as shown in the census figures, indicates plainly the natural desires of the people of this country.
