HARVEST IS IN FULL SWING NOW

Joseph Crop of Wheat Is Good; Stock Has Summered Well on Innaba, Shipping Starts.

JOSEPH, Sept. 1.—(Special.)—The harvest is going full blast around Joseph and there are some fine yields of wheat. One field yields above fifty bushels to the acre and many others on irrigated land are around forty-five bushels per acre. Hill land yields thirty to thirty-five bushels. Practically every threshing machine available is busy every day and we are spared too much rain during harvest that handicapped us so last year. Several carloads of new wheat have already been shipped.

Joseph school begins Sept. 5 with most of the old teachers back in place. H. H. Joy is superintendent. Mr. and Mrs. Samuel Anney, Ralph Feit and Miss Ella Allen are the high school teachers, Miss Allen being the only newcomer.

Mr. Feit has repudiated bachelor blessedness by taking a wife. Mr. Feit and Miss Gertrude Kennedy, a last year's Joseph high school graduate, were united in marriage Monday, Aug. 29.

Members of the Marr Flat Stock Association, most of whom live on the Innaba, shipped fourteen loads of cattle from Joseph last week and Gorsline shipped one carload at the same time. All stock has summered in fine shape and there is abundant feed in the valley for winter. Come snow—come rain—in their season, we have had a fine year for growing things.

BOYS FORM A WIRELESS CLUB

Reid Cox Elected President
Club of Boys Who Will
Study Wireless Telegraphy.

A wireless club was formed at the Y. M. C. A. Tuesday night by boys interested in the study of the problems connected with wireless telegraphy. The club will meet at the Y. M. C. A. every Saturday afternoon at one o'clock. Officers were elected as follows: Reid Cox, president; Francis Robinson, vice-president; Howard Beatty, secretary; Merlin Maygar, treasurer.

A regular course of study is to be outlined and the fall and winter months will be devoted to this study supplemented by talks on various phases of wireless by qualified speakers. It is planned to have several of the high school instructors whose special training fit them to speak authoritatively on subjects connected with wireless telegraph govern some of the talks while others will be given by others in a position to be able to enlighten the boys on the subject they have to study during their spare time.

Books and periodicals dealing with wireless will be secured and placed in the Y. M. C. A. where all members of the club can have access to them. It is also possible that at some later date a wireless outfit will be installed in the Y. M. C. A. This was talked of at the organization meeting but nothing done in regard to this part of the plans of the club.

Practically all of the boys in the club have wireless outfits. Of those outfits probably the finest is that of Reid Cox. He has an outfit that can pick up practically every message sent.

The membership is to be limited to boys over 14 years of age. The only exception to be made in this rule is in the case of boys passing a test showing that they have a knowledge of wireless that would entitle them to membership regardless of their age. The tests in such cases are to be given to the officers.

RUTH HART'S BRAVERY TOLD

Sister of Girl Drowned in Alaska Catastrophe Receives Letter from Survivor.

PENDLETON, Sept. 1.—The bravery with which Miss Ruth Hart, Pendleton girl, met her death on the steamer Alaska is told in a letter received here by her sister, Mrs. G. W. Phelps, from G. W. Owen, one of the survivors of the wreck who was with Miss Hart when the boat went down. Following is the letter, which contains the first details of the death of Miss Hart received in Pendleton:

"When I first met Ruth Hart she was in the water, as soon as the boat went down. When I came to the surface she asked me if I would help her. She was trying to float with her feet on top of the water. I got her head up and told her to let her feet down. Just then a lot of wreckage came down from the ship; the whole upper deck came off and floated around us.

"I caught hold of a few boards with each hand and drove them close to us and we both held to them. After we had floated for a while I asked her name and she told me she was Ruth Hart, from Pendleton, Oregon. "She was hopeful all the time. She behaved nobly. She made no trouble at all. There was a man a short distance from us taking on; he was screaming at the top of his voice. Miss Hart spoke up and said to him 'You just cut that out, this is no place for that kind of work.' "We were together several hours; it seemed to me. We quit talking. I don't know which of us went to sleep first. I was picked up between three and four o'clock in the morning. I was unconscious when picked up. They told me I had been on the Anzov about two hours when I woke. When I got to the hospital I inquired for Ruth Hart.

"The nurses tried to look her up. They brought me one paper that had her listed as saved and another, lost. Afterwards they heard she was at the Vance hotel. When I got out of the hospital I went to all the other hospitals in town and then to the telegraph office and inquired if there had been any inquiry about Ruth Hart of Pendleton. The operator said yes and gave me a copy of the message from her uncle. I was hoping to find she was saved. Later, I understood her body came to San Francisco.

"I do not think she was in a lifeboat. I think she stayed with the ship until it went down. The crew did not seem to understand how to get the lifeboats off."

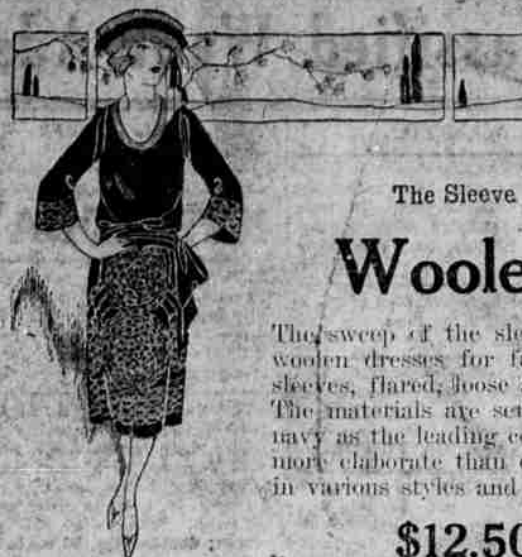
