FENCING BOUTS IN NOVEMBER

Quadrennial Matches Between United States and Great Britain Are Arranged.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 3.—The first of the quadrennial international fencing matches between Great Britain and the United States will take place in Washington, Philadelphia and New York shortly after the opening of the international conference on limitation of armaments. With the presence in the United States capital of many distinguished foreigners, including representatives of the British government who will turn out in force to back their team, the match in Washington November 19 should attract a brilliant audience.

Arrangements have been completed for the three matches and the British team, under the captaincy of Col. Ronald Campbell, chief of physical training in the British army, is to sail for the United States on November 1. The opening match will be the sabre team match at Philadelphia on November 17. The second match will be the dueling sword match at Washington, November 19. The final match will be with foils at New York City, November 22. The team winning the majority of the matches wins the series and the trophy. The groundwork of the United States teams probably will be composed of army and navy officers, which lends a semi-official status to the contests.

SCHOOLS FOR NURSES OPEN

Three Public Health Service Institutions Training Nurses Now.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 3.—Hospital training schools for nurses were opened Sept. 1, for young women, between 21 and 35 years, at the Fox Hills, Staten Island, N. Y., and the Port Maitland, Baltimore, Md., hospitals of the Public Health Service to educate prospective nurses for the United States Public Health Service Nurse Corps. Surgeon General Cummings of the Public Health Service, the head of the new United States Training School for Nurses, has been receiving applications, in person and writing, at the office of Surgeon General, which is the headquarters of the school. In announcing the establishment of the new school, Surgeon General Cummings stated it would offer to women desiring to take up the profession of nursing a course of study leading to a diploma and an opportunity in caring for disabled military patients.

The course is to be three years, with a month's vacation each year, an allowance of \$29 monthly for the first two years and \$50 monthly for the third year to provide for uniforms and school expenses. Quarters, subsistence, laundry and text books will be supplied free and no tuition fee is required. Connection between the student and the school may be severed at any time during the period of training.
