BIG PROBLEM NEAR SOLUTION

Eliminating Water Hyacinth From Bayous of Mississippi Is Now Achieved.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 3.—After nineteen years of expensive and laborious effort, with only varying success, interested shipping interests and government experts now express the belief that a method has been found that will solve the problem of the water hyacinth that is choking practically every bayou in the state with its green and lavender floral magnificence. The new method, which was suggested by Governor John M. Parker, is the simple application of live steam.

Preliminary reports from experiments now under way, according to government agents, indicate that the governor has at least pointed a way to check, if not exterminate the plant that has proved such a menace to Louisiana's inland waterways for the last twenty years and which, according to government observers, is now threatening the fresh water portion of the Panama canal.

The water hyacinth appeared in Louisiana immediately after the Cotton Centennial exposition here in 1884. The plant, which is a native of South America, was exhibited at the fair and its beauty was greatly admired. At the close of the fair a number of plants were taken to the country districts for growth in garden pools. When they overran the pools they were thrown into nearby bayous, where they caused heavy losses by choking the bayous and streams to such an extent that small vessels could not make their way through the tangled masses of foliage and roots which at places extended for miles and miles with no break of channel through them.

From a beautiful curiosity in 1884 they became a decided menace in 1895 and had so clogged a number of streams that an appeal was made to Congress for relief and, in 1899, \$25,000 was appropriated for the purpose of extermination. Since then hundreds of thousands of dollars have been spent in the fight.

Today there is hardly a stream in Louisiana that does not become so clogged with the hyacinth that navigation is almost impossible in the summer months.

SHIP USED FOR SAMPLE ROOMS

American Ship Loaded with Samples of Manufactures to Visit Over 50 Ports

NEW YORK, Sept. 3.—The American steamship St. Louis, fitted out as a floating exhibition hall with samples of the products of three hundred leading American manufacturers, will leave New York next January on an American sales promotion trip to 50 foreign ports. The slogan of the enterprise, "I'll Tell the World," will fly from the forepeak. The trip will take a year. The exhibition space is equal to that of Madison Square Garden.

Although there are a few misgivings about the present being auspicious for such a trip, J. Herbert Anderson, the promoter, says it should be remembered that business conditions in some parts of South America are good and will be improved in 1922. Japan,

China, India, Australia, Norway and Sweden have been to a degree freed from much of the financial worry that followed the world war, he says, and the Balkan states should be a fertile field for the exchange of commodities. All these countries will be included in the itinerary of the St. Louis.
