PIONEER WOMAN DIED MONDAY

Mrs. Nancy J. Turner Passed Away After Illness of Few Minutes; Came West in 1864.

Nancy J. Turner, familiarly known by all in her neighborhood as "Grandma" Turner, widow of J. J. Turner, who died July 25th, 1914, passed away at her farm home near Medical Springs Monday morning after an illness of only a few minutes and died before assistance could be called. She was remarkably strong and vigorous for her age and her demise came as a great shock to her family and many friends.

Mrs. Turner was a pioneer of Union and Baker counties, having crossed the plains in 1864 and had resided at Medical Springs for over fifty years. Mrs. Turner was the mother of ten children, nine of whom survive her six sons and three daughters, as follows: James Cyrus, W. E. Claude and Frank Turner, of Medical Springs; Elmer Turner of North Powder; Albert J. of Union; Mrs. George Wright and Mrs. Fred Mayo of Union, and Mrs. Ada Hammersley of Baker.

Mrs. Turner was born in the state of Kentucky July 8, 1841.

UNCLE BILLY IS FOR LESS LAWS

Prominent Elgin Man Gives Views on Legislation in Oregon.

What we need is a legislature that will annul seven-eighths of all laws passed by the last ten sessions.
