GREAT LUCK IN OREGON FORESTS

Fires Have Failed to Overtake This State and General Thankfulness Is Felt.

While forest fires are destroying thousands of acres of valuable timber land, and even leveling town and villages in Minnesota, Oregon is relatively free from forest fires this month. The Forest Patrolman, issued at Portland reviews the situation in Oregon in its current issue, going on to say: "Coast territory and Eastern Oregon are now in good condition as a result of rains recently. The Cascades are still menaced with some danger. A number of lightning fires occurred during August in Central Oregon but the loss was comparatively light. In Northwestern Oregon but one camp suffered. A large number of fires have been handled, but have been conquered before serious loss occurred." It is of interest to note that 87 prosecutions for violations of forest protection laws have been instituted in Oregon this year and that alone has a tendency to reduce careless origin of fires, and the paper notes that there is a disposition on the part of the public to ever "Protect the Forest."

All Brands Must Be Registered in State

The branding laws of the state of Oregon are very strict and Sheriff Lee Warnick today called attention to some of the provisions that must be observed by all stockmen. All brands must be registered in the office of the state veterinarian and each county inspector, or in counties where there are now inspectors in this county, in each county clerk's office, a record must be kept for public inspection of all brands so registered.

The use of unregistered brands is punishable by a fine of not to exceed \$250 or imprisonment not to exceed six months. Stockyards are also required to keep a record of brands.

BID ON BONDS IS RECEIVED

Two Local Men Agree to Bid 95 Per Cent of Par for Improvement District Bonds.

At the meeting of the city commission last evening a proposal in writing was made by R. J. Green and W. H. Reuter to purchase improvement bonds of improvement district No. 119, calling for the improvement of Second street from O to N and of N avenue from Second to First with macadam paving. Green and Reuter agree to bid 95 per cent of the value of the bonds if the contract is let and the sale of the bonds is advertised in the proper manner.

Under the charter, it was pointed out by the commissioners during the discussion of the proposal, bonds cannot be sold for less than par value and bear a maximum of five per cent interest. Provisions are also made in the charter that bonds cannot be issued for more than the cost of the improvements, which would make it impossible to issue bonds at less than par.

After considerable discussion it was decided that the best plan would be to ascertain whether or not contractors would be willing to take the bonds in payment, knowing that Green and Reuter are ready to purchase their bonds at 95 per cent of par. City Manager George Garrett was ordered to get in touch with contractors this week and report next week and if local contractors express their willingness to take the bonds under these conditions bids will immediately be advertised for and the work will be done this fall.
