Round-up Draws Many Riders of Both Sexes in Preparation for Biggest Event of Kind.

PENDLETON, Sept. 12.—An array of performers who will compete for world's championships—a prize list that in cash and added trophies is the greatest ever offered—fast relay strings, snappy young stews and the wildest of bucking breaks—these are some of the features promised for the 1921 Pendleton Round-Up, September 22, 23 and 24.

Gay in brilliant shirts and fuzzy chaps, cowboys and cowgirls are already gathering in Pendleton in anticipation of the big event. Indiana are ready with their headed buckskins, oft teeth strings, furs and other trappings, for the Indian parades and ceremonials which are a part of each day's program. Soon their tepees will be pitched at the Round-Up grounds and smoke from the campfires will mingle with dust from the corral where the try-outs are now being held.

These try-outs, by the way are revealing that the contests between man and beast will be as zestful as in former years. The Round-Up association's brinks seem to have accumulated an ample supply of venom and promise many unexpected twists and turns for would-be riders. Whistlin' Annie, that temperamental buck who's antics were among last year's thrillers, Whistler and Domino, each with a special brand of devilment—these and others are showing good stuff for the bucking contests.

"The best train service ever afforded Round-Up visitors," is the way William McMurray, general passenger agent, characterizes the service for this year. Pendleton homes will be swollen open to visitors, and the Round-Up association, made up of prominent Pendleton citizens, promises that there shall be no profiteering. The seal sale now under way is the largest in the history of the show, now in its twelfth year of successful presentation.

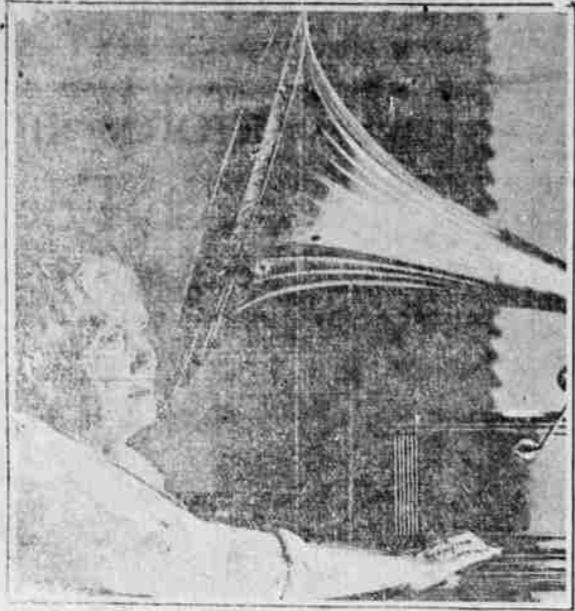

Are you a red-blooded boy to whom school, text-books, and teachers appear a never-ending grind? Are you teasing to quit school in order to go into business? "Your biggest job, School or Business" is a peppy little book written by a man full of cordial sympathy for you. By all means read it. The perplexed and indignant parent will also find sane counsel in its pages.

The U. S. National Bank has kindly given the library the use of a window for the display of books from time to time. Those on display this week are the "Americanization of Edward Bok," which received the Pulitzer prize for the best American biography of the year; "That damn Y," an account of the Y. M. C. A.; "Ways of the Circus" by a lion tamer connected with Barnum & Bailey and the Ringling Bros.; "Our Women" by Arnold Bennett is a provocative discussion of the eternal feminine; "Happy Hunting Grounds" by Kermit Roosevelt and the "Adventures of a Nature Guide" by Enos Mills speak for themselves; "Modern American Plays" contains five recent plays, two of which were great popular successes on the stage.

The Pacific Northwest Library Association held its annual conference Sept. 1-3 at the Davenport hotel in Spokane. Montana had the largest delegation present. The program was entirely devoted to the needs, standards, and problems of the small or medium-sized library. La Grande was chosen to represent the small library for Oregon, in a comparison of budgets and work done. We showed up a very good average in this comparison. Other towns surpassed us in a few different items but we

were consistently good on each point. The report of the subscription book committee on the desirability of books offered for sale by book agents is to be published this year and distributed more widely so that the public may be advised of the shortcomings of the books so offered for sale. Also definite action was taken on making available a complete list of the books in the Northwest, which are in raised type for the blind. The public libraries desire greatly to know what blind people there are in their territories so that they may serve them free reading material also. G. A. R. Meets Again In Indianapolis on September 25 to 29

INDIANAPOLIS, Sept. 12.—For the fourth time since the Grand Army of the Republic was organized in 1866 it will convene in Indianapolis Sept. 25 to 29 for its annual meeting. No other city has had the honor to entertain more than three times. Previous encampments were held here in 1881, 1883 and 1920.

On the opening day, Sunday, past commanders and national officers of the G. A. R. will occupy pulpits in the local churches and deliver patriotic addresses. Monday the credentials and executive committees will meet and that evening a reception for the veterans and members of affiliated organizations will be held in the state house by Governor Warren T. McCray.
